bler, pasture and hay plantings in the valley, and methods of plantings etc., of sweet clover. This conference proved to have immense practical value and the discussions were quite free and to the point.

S. E. Miller, of Union, presided over the livestock division and the county agriculturalist of Wallawa county, N. C. Donaldson, was presented to serve in the capacity of a specialist, and also spoke on the present situation. Mr. Miller, T. B. Johnson, of Cave, Homer Bidwell, Ed. Boswell, Jim Dobbin and H. G. Avery dealt with pertinent topics. Roger Morse, county agent of Baker county, had for his topic diseases to which sheep fall heir.

The poultry division this morning was very interesting, with those attending presenting their problems, the discussion of which brought out much that was worth while and of interest to all the poultry raisers present. A. I. Voelz was chairman and H. E. Cosby, poultry specialist talked of the outlook in this field and also on the mixing of feed and the care of baby chicks. Other speakers here were Mr. Voelz and Robert Wilchcombe, superintendent of the experiment station at Union.

In each group, following the scheduled program, the report was prepared which is to be presented at the general meeting being held this afternoon.

Luncheon at Noon
At noon the visitors of the Economic conference were guests of the Union county chamber of commerce at a luncheon in the high school domestic science room. The luncheon, well prepared and served by La Grande High school girls, was largely a courtesy to the visitors and its main object was to promote the spirit of good fellowship between local business men, farmers and out-of-town guests.

EGG AND BUTTER PRICES STRONG

Movement into Storage Begins—Broccoli Is in Moderate Supply

PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 25 (AP)—Eggs began to move into storage here yesterday, 400 cases being reported in coolers. Prices have been firm all week and standard firsts took another rise of a cent yesterday. Other classes remained steady.

Seattle demand for butter continued in local markets yesterday and practically all surplus supply was shipped north. Prices were firm, with standard cubes a cent higher at 46c.

No action was taken on the four resignations from the dairy exchange which were tendered early in the week, as it is hoped that the differences which occasioned "dis-satisfaction" may be adjusted.

The country dressed meat markets have held steady all week at firm prices and movement of most classes has been fairly large. Hogs are somewhat druggish today, however, but prices are not notably lower, best lights bringing 12 1/2 to 13c.

Poultry markets are well cleaned up also on most classes with light and medium hens rather scarce. Heavy hens are in large supply. There has been unusually good demand for turkeys and it is reported that demand will continue next week. A carload of turkeys is being accumulated for eastern shipment, which will be the last car to leave this market this season, and raisers are advised to get their turkeys in early in the week as demand will decrease materially after the present shipment moves out. Prices on all classes of poultry are steady and unchanged.

Broccoli is in moderate supply on the wholesale vegetable market with almost everything offered from California. Cold nights have delayed maturing of roseburg stuff and none has come in the last week to speak of. Prices are firm, desirable sizes of No. 1 bringing \$1.50 to \$1.60 today, and indications pointing to higher values early next week.

Trade Heavy In Stock Exchange; Close Irregular

NEW YORK, Feb. 25 (AP)—Heavy buying of Wallach common, which soared 6 1/2 points to 66 on rumors of competitive buying for control, featured today's stock market. Price movements in the general list lacked uniformity, although rails showed a pronounced upward trend and most of the industrials pointed upward.

The closing was irregular. Total sales, approximately 1,000,000 shares.

Wheat Off When Market Closes

CHICAGO, Feb. 25 (AP)—Opening at 1 1/2 decline to 1 1/4 and 1/2, wheat subsequently scored additional gains. In some cases, corn, oats and provisions also developed firmness, corn starting unchanged to 1/2 up and later continuing to point higher.

Corn closed unsettled, 1/2 to 1/4 net lower, wheat 1/4 to 1/2 off; oats unchanged to 1/2 down and provisions unchanged to 1/2 higher.
