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The picture is a delight. The theme is a pleasing variation of the ever-popular "Cinderella" type, with Miss Pickford in the role of a stock-girl in the basement of the great "five and dime" establishment, and the leading man, Charles Rogers, as the son of the millionaire owner. A light-hearted humor that never reaches the slapstick variety, yet which pervades the entire film, serves to carry the audience along irresistibly, and Kathleen Norris, the noted novelist, has introduced an unusual degree of heart interest and appeal into the story.

Whether it was that designed the "sets" used in the production deserves a laurel wreath. The realism of the mammoth 5-and-10-cent store and of the huge street scenes is no small factor in maintaining the atmospheric quality of the picture.
