BUTTER AND EGG
PRICES STEADY

Higher Poultry Quota-
tions Expected—Meat
Market Quiet

PORTLAND, Feb. 27 (AP)—
Butter and egg prices were steady
today at Saturday's quotations with
receipts of both fairly heavy. Egg
storing is under way here now and
considerable are moving into the
cooler.

On the wholesale country dressed
meat markets things were
rather quiet early today with all
closures steady and the market well
cleared up. The pork market has
been drab the past week and "o-
ceps" have exceeded the market's
capacity to consume.

Poultry markets were well cleared
out on all classes early today
with all weights of hens quite
scarce. Higher prices on hens are
probable later in the week, but they
were quoted steady today. Tur-
keys were in good demand today
on account of accumulation of a
car for shipment east later in the
week.

Best cauliflower from California
was in good demand around \$1.50
a 1.75 for large sizes of No. 1,
while Rothenburg offerings were
quoted around \$1.50 a 1.60 top.
Considerable No. 2 cauliflower run-
ning to small sizes was moving as
low as \$1 per crate.

Considerable speculation is go-
ing on in the potato market and
prices are firm. Reported short-
age of supplies in storage in the
east have caused belief that de-
mand may become good for local
holdings.

Onions are steady with move-
ment light and outside demand
small. It is estimated that about
150 carloads of Yellow Danvers are
still in cellars in this territory.

Wheat Strong And
Higher At Close

CHICAGO, Feb. 27 (AP)—
Opening unchanged to 1/8¢-1/4¢
lower, corn subsequently under-
went a general rise. Wheat started
1/2¢ to 3/4¢ up and later cleared
all around. Oats were steady.
Provisions tended to advance.
Wheat closed strong 1/4¢-1/2¢
net higher; corn 1/8¢-1/4¢ up; oats
showing 1/8¢-1/4¢ advance and pro-
visions at 17¢-21¢ gain.

U. S. Steel Hits
Slide But Gains
In Closing Hour

NEW YORK, Feb. 27 (AP)—
The stock market went through a
secondary reaction today in which
U. S. Steel common and several
other popular industrials touched
new low levels for the year. Early
declines ran 1 to 6 points with
speculators bearing the brunt of
selling pressure. Trading was only
moderately heavy in volume.
Recovery from early lows ran
2 to 5 points in many leaders such
as Vanadium Steel, International
Nickel, Greene Cananea Copper,
Radio, U. S. Cast Iron Pipe and
Commercial Solvents. U. S. Steel
moved above 139 again. Total
sales approximated 1,550,000
shares.

MAGNETIC FORCE
IS MOTOR'S FUEL

Young Inventor Declares
There Is No "Humbug"
About New Machine

PITTSBURGH, Feb. 27 (AP)—
Lester J. Henderson, 29-year-old
West Elizabeth, Pa., inventor,
whose fuelless motor has gained
the interest of Col. Charles A. Lin-
dbergh and others prominent in the
aviation world, wants the "humbug"
eliminated from reports on his
invention which he developed
while experimenting on an effort
to produce an improved compass.
"Make it clear to the world," he
said, in commenting on stories giv-
ing various descriptions to his crea-
tion, "that radio and its allied
phenomena have nothing to do
with my motor."
"The force that turns my motor
is the same force that pulls the
needle of a compass around—and
there is nothing mysterious about
that."

NEW YORK, Feb. 27 (AP)—
The Henderson "fuelless motor"
was in New York today to be put
under the critical eyes of electrical
experts as soon as a patent can be
obtained.

It has already mystified several
men familiar with electricity, said
Major Thomas B. Langhiser, flight
commander at Selfridge field,
Michigan and leader of the first
pursuit group at the hotel Hill-
more, where he and Col. Charles
A. Lindbergh and a party of
friends are staying.

Difficulty in obtaining a patent
was found, he said, as the patent
office could find no classification
for the motor. Attorneys have
taken the matter in hand and as
soon as a patent is obtained the
motor will probably be tested un-
der the supervision of experts of
the Guggenheim foundation for
promotion of aeronautics.
