Price Movement In Wall Street Uncertain Today

NEW YORK, Feb. 28 (AP)—Uncertain price movements characterized today's dull stock market. Standard Industrials and rails moved within a rather narrow range, while bullish demonstrations for a selected assortment of tobaccos, oil, public utilities and merchandising issues were offset by the weakness of a few specialties. The closing was irregular. A number of shares which seldom achieve prominence moved up briskly in the final hour, including Southern Pacific A, Austin Nichols, and United Carbon. Good gains also were recorded by Pan American B, American Sugar, Pierce-Arrow preferred and Western Union. Weakness, however, was evident in Montana Power, Yellow Truck and Adams Express, the last mentioned surging 5 points. General Motors and Hudson Motors also were freely sold at intervals. Total sales approximated 1,500,000 shares.

Butter And Egg Prices Remain Fairly Steady

PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 28 (AP)—Butter and egg prices remained steady today except for a 1/4c rise in the quotation on prime firsts butter. Seattle demand for butter continues in the market and most of the surplus has been moving north. Action on the four resignations tendered last week went over until Wednesday. Poultry prices were steady to a trifle stronger with top on heavier 23c, ranging downward on other classes to 16c for light lights. Quotations were unchanged today with little stock available. Heavy receipts of hogs today and yesterday kept prices weak, although demand has improved slightly. Best lights were bringing 12c early today but most sales were under that figure. Veal was also a little easier, best grades going to the trade around 20c. Lams continued firm with demand good and offerings small, moving mostly around 24 @ 25c. More activity is noticeable in the potato market, following reports of shipping demand at Yakima and Idaho Falls from eastern centers. Latest bids to growers in this vicinity are reported around \$1 to \$1.10 for No. 1 Burbanks, although some are holding for higher prices. Conditions in the onion division are little changed, most growers holding for around \$2 for yellow Danvers No. 1, with buyers scarce and offerings about \$1.55 and sacks for what few are moving. Broccoli shipments from the Uniqua valley have commenced in earnest and the price is firmer. The quality is reported excellent and demand is large. Hauling prices today were around \$1.75 top for No. 1 stock and 25 to 50c lower for No. 2.

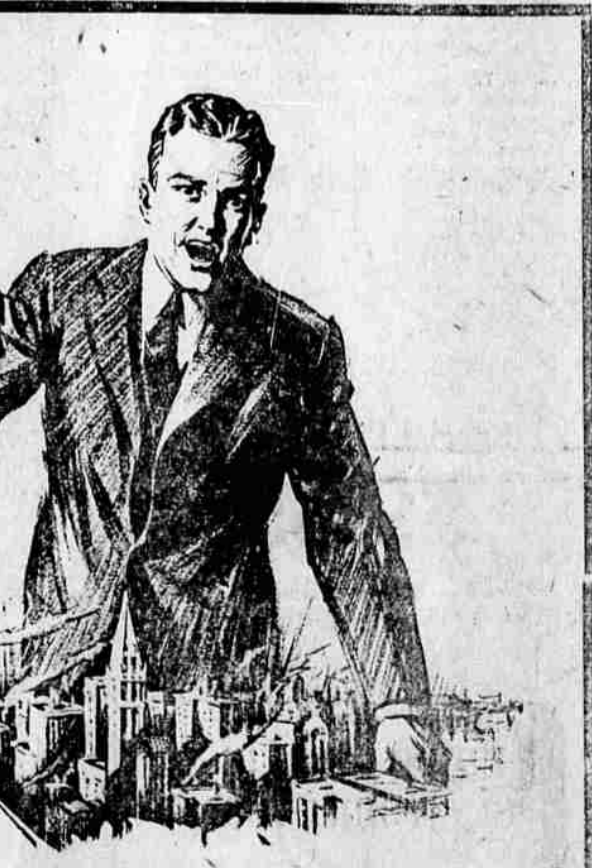
