BUTTER PRICES REMAIN STEADY

Butterfat Market Bullish, However; Potato Mart Somewhat Easier

PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 29 (AP)—Although butter prices remained steady today, the butterfat market is decidedly bullish with creamerymen bidding keenly against each other for locally delivered fat. One large creamery was bidding 54c for butterfat yesterday, while other bids ran as high as 55c per hundred.

Outside demand for butter continues to be practically no profit. Buttermakers admit, when prices for fat remain so high.

In the egg division of the dairy exchange, prices remained steady and trading was moderate. It is proposed to establish a new grade of eggs to take care of dirties, but the matter will be considered carefully before action is taken.

Poultry prices remained steady today, notwithstanding scarcity of nearly all classes of hens. Demand is moderate for most classes but turkeys, which are finding a ready market.

Receipts of country dressed meats were also moderate today but prices were quoted the same as yesterday. Demand for choice lamb continues good, and sales today brought 24 1/2 to 25c to a shade higher. Veal is also moving readily, mostly around 20 1/2 to 21c. Pork is easier following slight recessions at the North Portland yards yesterday.

The potato market is considerably easier today, following a recent flurry. Demand for choice tubers continues good, and sales today brought 24 1/2 to 25c to a shade higher. Veal is also moving readily, mostly around 20 1/2 to 21c. Pork is easier following slight recessions at the North Portland yards yesterday.

Onions remain steady with movement slow. Oregon shipments for February are estimated at 84 cars.

Wheat Unsettled And Higher Today

CHICAGO, Feb. 29 (AP)—Opening 1/2c off to 3/4c up, wheat later showed all around gains. Corn stated unchanged to 3/4c down and subsequently scored a sharp rally. Oats were strong. Provisions tended upward.

Wheat closed unsettled, 1/2 to 3/4c net higher, corn 3/4 to 1 1/2c up, oats showing 1/2 to 3/4c advance and provisions varying from 5c decline to a rise of 10c.

NEW YORK, Feb. 29 (AP)—Stock prices turned upward today after an early period of irregularity. The buying movement, which started in the oil group, soon spread to the steel, motor, merchandising, public utility and specialty issues. Bear traders continued nevertheless to forest all weak spots, forcing a sharp decline in Continental Baking A on fears for the safety of the dividend and in some of the southern railroad shares.

The closing was strong. Animated buying broke out again in various specialties in the late afternoon, some of the high priced shares making sensational advances. International Silver got up 10 points and Warren Brothers 8. Good gains also were recorded by International Paper, International Combustion, American Radiator, Allied Chemical and Bayuk Cigars, the last named reaching a new peak. Atchafalca was heavy. Total sales approximated 1,900,000 shares.
