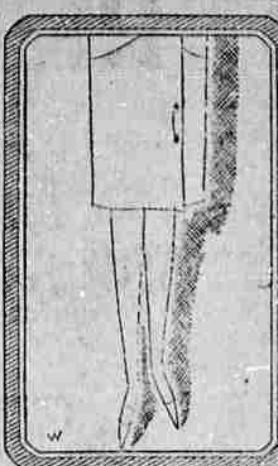

Bridge Pointers

CONTRACT BRIDGE

Yesterday our subject was the strength requisite to justify the jump of a partner's No Trump to two, and today we consider under what conditions a partner's underbid should be jumped.

They are many who seem to think that a jump to three is quite unnecessary; that all that they have to do, when partner has bid one No Trump and they are strong, is to jump to two. They assume that the original bidder, encouraged by the jump, will make the last lap of the journey and reach the game-going declaration. When a sound dealer has bid a minimum one No Trump on the first round, he will not go on. A "count" of 12 justifies an original bid of one No Trump, a count of 17 is sound basis for an original two-bid with a count of 15 or 16. Dealer bidding one No Trump would be justified in jumping his partner's two No Trumps to three. But a Dealer who bids an original No Trump counting 12 or 13 has "said his say" and should not re-bid. One of the most fatal habits that player can contract is re-bidding for game after having shown practically the entire strength of the hand by his initial bid.

Therefore assuming sound initial bidding, when the bidder's partner has such strength that game with a minimum No Trump is required for a jump to two. The two-bid may be left in when there is a game in the combined hand. Of course this jump to three is a hazardous step and requires real strength to justify it. Broadly speaking, about a trick more than game with a minimum No Trump is required for a jump to two. The minimum count may be said to be 12, with 13 more conservative. The jump as a rule should not be made with 12 if the play of the partner be non-dependable and if the hand do not contain a Ten. Strong intermediates are of great advantage in a Dummy hand.

Navy Blue Heads Spring Color Card

(Associated Press Fashion Editor) PARIS (AP)—The Rue de la Paix has traded its crow for a blue bird.

Black divides with navy blue the honors it held as the favorite winter color. Especially for street and sport wear is navy blue the pet of Parisians.

Beige of a pale creamy tint gets third place on the color card. Navy blue, black, light beige and gray is the way the colors ran in the spring fashion shows. The new beige is lighter and richer than any previous natural shade that has been popular. Paris uses it in silk and wool crepe for street and cashmere or jersey for sports. It is seldom used for evening, although there are a few late examples of the new beige.

Fifth on the list is pale blue, which is often combined with navy. The shades range from turquoise to eel. Bright reds are much in evidence, nearly every house showing a few lacquer or seeling wax colored dresses. One dressmaker combines pale pink with cherry red. A great deal of yellow is used for spring, the shades ranging from soft maize to rich sulphur, which is successfully combined with brown.

For evening, emerald green is

shown in many collections. One style authority is partial to combinations of ruby red and emerald green. Bright violet has not disappeared from the salons and some orchid and mauve shades are used.

An important spring combination is dark blue with white and black and white. White cotton fabrics are frequently used as collar and cuffs or trimming touches on dark silk or wool costumes. One dressmaker uses yellow in the same way. Navy blue or black foulards with white polka dots are an important phase of spring style. One house adds polka dot scarves to nearly every day costume. Bright red satins printed with white polka dots are quite generally shown, particularly for young girls' costumes.

eggs, 4 tablespoons sugar, 1 teaspoon vanilla, few grains salt, stale cake.

Beat yolks of eggs slightly with 1 tablespoon sugar and a few grains of salt. Heat milk in double boiler and slowly add to first mixture, stirring constantly. Return to double boiler and cook until mixture coats a silver spoon. Arrange a layer of cake cut in slices in a well buttered baking dish. Pour over a layer of custard and continue layer for layer of custard and cake until all the custard is used. Cover and let stand for 30 minutes. Remove cover and bake in a slow oven for 20 minutes. Beat whites of eggs until stiff and dry and fold in remaining sugar. Add vanilla and pile over top of pudding. Bake in a slow oven for eight minutes to cook and color the meringue. Let cool and serve.
