from both the floor and the gal-  
leries, while Vice President Dawes  
pounded for order.  
Senator Edge, republican, New  
Jersey, then asked if the Wash-  
ington senator would "repudiate a  
solemn contract with both political  
parties" and leave Nicaragua to  
"bloodshed."  
"It will not be American blood-  
shed," Dill said. "I am against  
sending American lives to buy  
profits for men who have invest-  
ments in Nicaragua."

MANAGUA, Nicaragua, Mar. 2.  
(AP)—One Sandino rebel was killed  
and another wounded in a clash  
between rebel forces and an Ameri-  
can marine and Nicaraguan national  
guard patrol, say reports re-  
ceived here today from the interior.  
The patrol was under the com-  
mand of Lieut. Lejane Cronmiller  
Jr., who was operating near Somoto,  
29 miles southwest of Coatal.  
There were no marine casualties.

The fighting wounded 34 Darahl  
and now on route to Coatal by ex-  
act and will be transferred to  
Managua by airplane as soon as  
possible. In the absence of further  
information it is believed here  
that Lieut. Davis the most seriously  
wounded of the American casu-  
alties, is recovering.  
Marine headquarters here say  
that although no definite report  
has been received from the scene,  
Monday's fight at Darahl has all  
the marks of an ambush.

## TWO BODIES TAKEN FROM SHIP CANAL

were attacked by a motor, bound  
and tossed into the water. The  
other was that the parents or  
guardians, firing of the responsi-  
bility of parenthood or desiring to  
gain an inheritance, tossed the boys  
into the muddy waters. No report  
of missing children has been made  
in this vicinity. Scores of persons  
viewed the body of the first boy  
but none identified him.

Drug Canal  
To satisfy themselves that no  
other bodies are in the canal, the  
police planned to drag it for more  
than a mile today.  
Because the two bodies have  
striking resemblances to each other,  
and were dressed alike, police  
and county coroner believe them  
to be brothers, apparently from a  
family in easy circumstances. The  
first boy appeared to be about nine  
years of age and the second looked  
about a year younger.  
The wire that bound them was  
similar and bound in such a fash-  
ion as to indicate they were tied  
together. Chief of Police John Re-  
gan believes the bodies were  
weighted but that the wire broke,  
allowing the bodies to come to the  
surface. Both had been in the  
water about four weeks.
