Wheat Is Up As Market Closes

CHICAGO, Mar. 2 (AP)—Opening unchanged to 1/2c up, corn later showed something of an advance all around. Wheat started unchanged to 1/2c off and then underwent a general setback. Oats were easy. Provisions likewise inclined downward.
Corn closed unsettled, a shade to 1/2c net higher, wheat 1/2 to 1/2c up, oats unchanged to 1/2c off, and provisions varying from 22c decline to a rise of 15c.

STOCK MARKET DRIFT AIMLESS

No Indication of Definite Trend; Bear Traders Find Weak Spots

NEW YORK, Mar. 2 (AP)—The stock market continued today to drift in rather aimless fashion, with no indication of a definite trend. Pools again marked up a few favorites 2 to 5 points at the time that bear traders were digging out new weak spots. Commission houses continued to advise caution in the making of new commitments, which was reflected in the relatively small volume of trading.
The closing was steady. Strength of General Motors, which was up almost 2 points, and the reduction in the call money rates drove the shorts to cover in the final hour. New buying was on a large scale in selected shares, particularly Laidlaw and Clark, Electric Storage Battery, Pierce-Arrow preferred and Schulte. Christie Brown advanced 6 points. Total sales approximated 1,800,000 shares.

Butter Prices Steady Today On Portland Market

PORTLAND, Ore., Mar. 2 (AP)—Butter prices were steady today, although prices for butterfat were a little easier. One creamery was still offering 55c for fat but the bulk is being bought around 53c delivered in Portland. Shipping point quotations are unchanged.

Dairy exchange quotations on eggs were steady and unchanged today except for a decline of 1/2c in standard firsts at 23 1/2c. Association quotations, however, were higher, extras being up a cent at 27c, firsts a half cent higher at 25 1/2c, and mediums a cent up at 25c. Underlined are unchanged.

Country dressed meat prices are a bit wobbly, with pork weak at 11 1/2c, veal a cent lower at 19 1/2c, and lamb firm at 24 1/2c to 25c. Beef is also firmer, especially for the better grades of steers.

Onions were a little firmer, with outside demand somewhat better. Buyers were offering \$1.50 to \$1.59 and sacks yesterday for U. S. No. 1 yellow Danvers.

Potatoes were steady but the market is dull and local trading nominal.

WOOL MARKET QUIET WITH PRICES FIRM

BOSTON, Mar. 2 (AP)—The Commercial Bulletin tomorrow will say:

"The market for wool is rather quiet and trading occurs in spots, where a dealer has wools suited to a mill's particular needs. Prices keep very firm on all descriptions. The goods market appears to be developing slowly but there evidently is a fair initial business being done, while consumption of wool at the mills goes on rather steadily."

"The foreign primary markets are exceedingly firm, with good demand from all quarters while the secondary markets of Europe are in excellent condition."

"Western contracting is on a limited scale but at fully recent prices. Mohair is quiet in the seaboard markets. Foreign markets are firm. Contracting on the goat's back is reported at 55c for adult and 65c for kid hair and occasionally a bit more."
