Mistreatment Of Peoples Denied By Mussolini

ROME, Mar. 3. (AP)—Denying Austrian charges that the German speaking peoples of the Italian Tyrol are being mistreated by the Italian government, Premier Mussolini today declared that Austrian interference in the international affairs of Italy was intolerable.

After declaring that the German language newspapers in the province of Bolzano will be suppressed unless the anti-Italian campaign beyond the Brenner pass is discontinued, the premier added:

"It is time to declare that incoherent speeches, odious insinuations and vulgar insults have only one result—to accelerate the turning of the fascist vice and open an abyss between two neighboring peoples."

Speaking before a thronged chamber, the premier declared that all reports about "systems of tyranny, brothers tortured and peoples slaughtered by the barbarous fascist dictatorship, besides being false, are appetitively ridiculous."

Not Pupils of Austria
"We are not pupils of Austria which for a whole century filled the countries of half Europe with executioners, filled the prisons with martyrs and erected everywhere scaffolds," the Italian premier continued.

"Any state respecting itself cannot tolerate such foreign intervention. Mr. Fuller, the governor of Massachusetts, supplied us with a striking example on the subject."

The above-mentioned individuals were not sent into forced domestic because they were German, but because they were anti-fascists, namely against the fascist revolution. The charges of fascist barbarism are reduced to this and nothing else."

The premier's speech was received with such enthusiasm that the entire chamber jumped to its feet and united in singing "Viva Mussolini," the fascist hymn.

LORAIN, Ohio, Mar. 3. (AP)—Fire starting from an overheated furnace destroyed the three-story brick Century building in the business district here early today with a loss estimated at approximately \$500,000.

Return Indictments Against Six Today

PORTLAND, Ore., Mar. 3. (AP)—The Multnomah county grand jury today returned indictments against six men held on morals charges growing out of vice-rings investigations.

The indictments include every arrest so far made, four others having already been indicted, three of the number serving sentences. Clarence Brazell, bond salesman, first to be arrested, has not yet gone to trial.

Those indicted today were Dr. G. Blaine Garrison, Portland physician, who is at liberty on \$12,000 bonds; Stanley O'Connor, radio entertainer, and Harold Kelly, bank clerk, both of whom are out on bond; Herbert S. Coffin, Portland druggist; Francis A. Satch, pharmacy student, and Robert Sisco, restaurant employee. The latter three were indicted on morals charges.

This was Mrs. Boyer's statement as she prepared today to appear Monday before special board of inquiry of immigration authorities to determine whether the child must go back to Canada, his place of birth.

"Nobody can take the baby from me, because where he goes I will go, too," his foster mother said. "If the United States sends him back to Canada because he came into this country illegally, I shall go with him. There will be no separation for us."

She said she always will be able to care for the child, and will see that he has a good education. The child has been disinherited by Myron L. Boyer, who only recently learned he was not his own son. Mrs. Boyer had admitted that four years ago she adopted the child from his Canadian mother and presented him to her husband as his son. She did it, she said, to "save her home." Boyer's legal proceedings to disinherit the child may deprive him of a \$5,000,000 inheritance provided for his "grandson" by the elder Boyer.
