Finn Leads At End Of Lap In Pyle Marathon

PUENTE, Cal., Mar. 5 (AP)—The \$25,000 prize Pacific-Atlantic marathon today was off on its long continental grind with 193 runners and walkers having put behind them the breaking-in stretch of 16 miles.

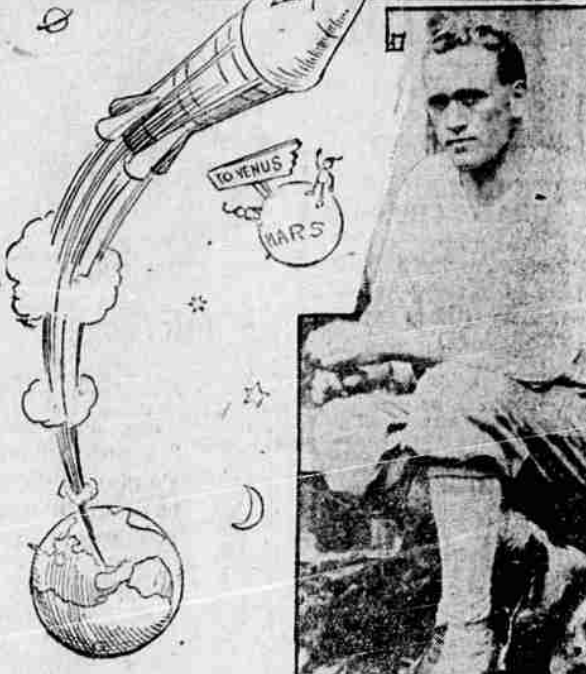
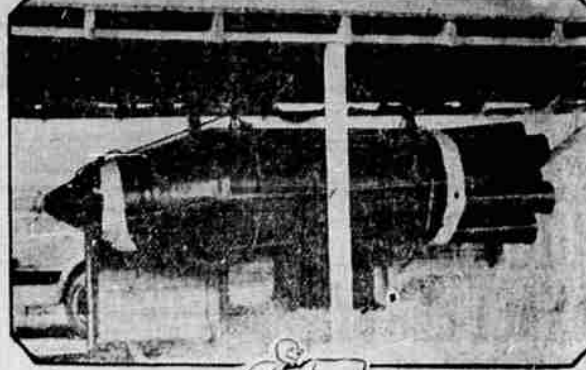
A nondescript group, ranging from youths of 18 years, to veterans of 63 started from Los Angeles yesterday afternoon as a parade of 275 contestants. Seventy-six fell by the wayside as they threaded their way through Sunday afternoon automobile traffic on the asphalt highway.

The first day's honors went to a sinewy Finn, 40-year-old Wille Kohlermainen of New York City. Running easily and finishing as though he could do 50 miles every day, he early stepped into and maintained the lead. His time was one hour, 38 minutes.

Gunnar Nilsson, also a Finnish runner of New York City, followed into the first control station a few seconds later. Sam Richman of New York City, the eastern terminus of the race, was third in four minutes more, and Nicholas Quomanwahu, Hopi Indian, from Orabi, Ark., came in two minutes behind Richman for fourth place.

The group of four leaders had stepped out in front at the end of four miles and kept closely

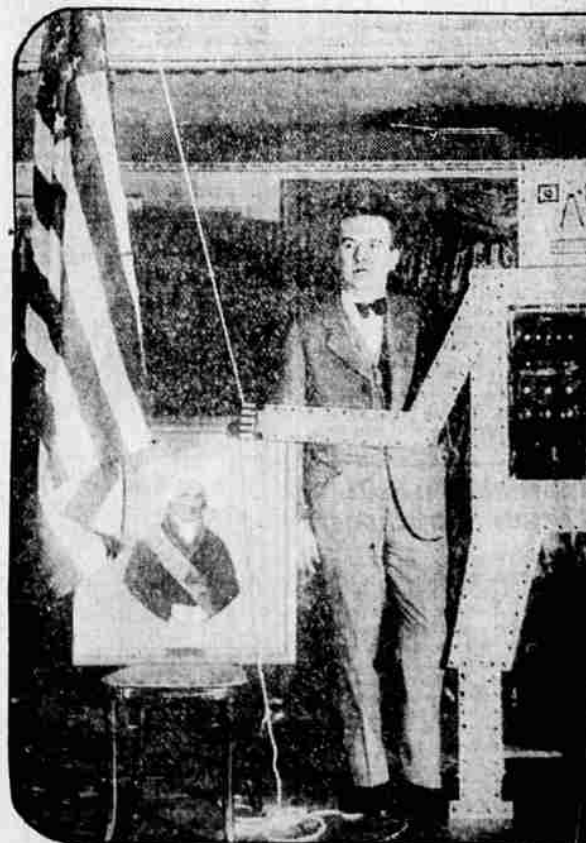
GOOD WHALE YEAR

FAMED GAMBLER DIES IN GUTTER

Last Big Game Believed by Police to Have Led to His Murder

NEW YORK, Mar. 5 (AP)—John Henry (Scarface) Spencer, whose nod was good for thousands of dollars where the big gamblers lay their bets, was found dying in a gutter in Brooklyn yesterday. His last big game was believed to have led to his murder.

But a few hours before, police said, he left a "floating crap game," so called because its location is changed each night and to which only the big players gain access, with \$75,000—his night's winnings. His pockets were empty and his diamond ring, stickpin and watch had been stripped from him when he was found. He died on the way to the hospital.

Some hours after Spencer was found dying the body of Richard Adams, a barber and race track gambler, also known as Richard Wallace, was found in a Brooklyn street, four bullet wounds showing the manner of his death. His wife said a man had called at their home in the Richmond Hill section of Brooklyn at 7:30 Sunday night and asked Adams to go for a ride. Adams was 25 years old.

Although police at first believed there might be some connection between the two murders they later were inclined to view this theory as hardly plausible since Adams was not known as a big gambler, and they held it was unlikely he was an associate of Spencer.

Widely Known

"Scarface," his nick name descriptive of a livid mark on his face which resulted from a hospital accident, was known in New Orleans, Havre de Grace, Baltimore, Lexington, Louisville, Saratoga, wherever the horses run and the big gamblers gather.

He was 38 years old, married, and had a five-year-old son. For fifteen years he had been known to police as a player and proprietor of gambling houses.

Hoover Asks That Name Be Withdrawn

WASHINGTON, Mar. 5 (AP)—Secretary Hoover has sent a letter to the secretary of state of Wisconsin asking that his name be withdrawn from the republican presidential primary in that state.

The commerce secretary was entered by Morton P. Hunter, a Milwaukee business man, who filed petitions calling for Mr. Hoover's entry into the primary.

This was done, it was explained by Hoover's managers here, without his consent or knowledge.

Friends of the cabinet officer who already has entered the republican primaries in Ohio and Maryland, have reiterated that he would not seek Wisconsin's delegates. They pointed out that he has no organization in that state and it was indicated that he had no desire to become involved in any republican factional strife between the La Follette element and their opponents.

Immigrants For Year In Canada Total 158,000

OTTAWA, Ont. (AP)—An immigrant to Canada crossed over the boundary lines of the Dominion every two minutes of daylight during 1927, according to the department of colonization and development of the Canadian Pacific railway in a report just made public here.

"Number of immigrants who entered Canada during the year totaled 158,884, an increase of 22,900 over 1926," the report states. "Immigration from the British Isles increased from 48,819 to 52,940, that from the United States from 29,944 to 22,818 and from other countries from 66,221 to 82,126."

"Ontario gained the largest number of immigrants, with a total of 39,228. Manitoba was second with 36,412. Western Canada got 54 per cent of the total."

"States of the United States that contributed most heavily to the Canadian immigration were: Michigan, 3,313; New York, 2,237; Washington, 1,990; Minnesota, 1,435; California, 1,095, and Massachusetts, 1,036. With the exception of the United Kingdom, Germany sent the largest number of immigrants from Europe, 9,150."
