Anastasia Not Czar's Daughter, Nobility Claims

PARIS, Mar. 5 (AP)—The claim of the mysterious Madame Anastasia Tchaikovsky, now in the United States, to be the late czar's daughter, is refuted in a series of statements published in two Russian vernacular weeklies appearing in Paris today.

Among those who deny the woman's claim are the Grand Duke Alexander, who married the Grand Duchess Marie, Princess Anastasia's aunt, former Premier Kozlovoff, Prince Yussouppoff and H. Krupensky, head of the Russian monarchists in France.

These declare that Madame Tchaikovsky speaks German well while the Princess Anastasia spoke it poorly. That she does not know English while Anastasia knew it perfectly and that her teeth are badly filled while the work on Anastasia's was done excellently. They also claim that her body failed to show supposed bullet and bayonet wounds, adding that these details supported their failure to recognize either the face or mentality of the czar's daughter in the present claimant.

Madame Tchaikovsky, who spent several years in a German asylum, arrived in the United States early last month, but since then her whereabouts have been a complete mystery. Surviving members of the Romanoff family have previously declared that she was not Princess Anastasia.

Robbers Get Eight Years In Prison

MEDFORD, March 5 (AP)—Robert White and Donald Jackson, transient youths, found guilty of the holdup and robbery of a restaurant in this city last December, were sentenced to serve eight years in state prison by Judge Louis P. Hewitt. District Attorney Newton Chaney recommended that the pair be given a life term in his plea. The defense counsel thought five years would be sufficient.

Grandstand Falls; 65 Persons Injured

BUDAPEST, Hungary, March 5 (AP)—A check upon the casualties suffered at a football game here yesterday when two sections of the grandstand collapsed showed that 65 persons suffered various injuries including broken arms and legs. The collapse of the stand was attended by a panic among the 40,000 spectators, who scrambled for the exits in fear that the entire stand would fall. More than 50 lawsuits were started today by those injured.

Haines Elevator Destroyed; Loss About \$55,000

HAINES, Ore., Mar. 5—A loss of between \$50,000 and \$55,000 was suffered by fire which destroyed the elevator and grain warehouse owned by E. W. Haines here Saturday. The building and approximately 12 carloads of grain were destroyed. Part of the loss was covered by insurance, but the exact amount could not be learned. The fire started inside of the building. Indications were, it was said, that the blaze was not incendiary.

SANTA MONICA, Calif., March 5 (AP)—Mrs. Harriet Johnson of Toluca, Kans., lost a \$1,200 diamond ring off her finger while feeding popcorn to the sea gulls here. She said one of the gulls seized her stone as it struck the water, and swallowed it and flew away.

Jackson Looking Into Prohi Case

MEDFORD, March 5 (AP)—A special session of the Jackson county grand jury called to investigate the handling of the local prohibition enforcement, in so far as it concerns the office of District Attorney Newton C. Chaney and it is said other matters bearing on the same subject, convened this morning with Mrs. Katie M. Gleaves of Prospect as forewoman. Attorney J. N. Johnson of Grants Pass was named a special prosecutor before the grand jury, by order of the court signed this morning.

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Snow Paralyzes Transportation In East Michigan

SAULTE STE MARIE, Mich., Mar. 5 (AP)—After freeing two passenger trains marooned by snow drifts for more than 18 hours, an army of workers were toiling today to break the snow blockade that has paralyzed transportation in the eastern section of the upper Michigan peninsula.

The trains were in South Shore line local, carrying about 30 passengers which stalled at Stronga 60 miles west of here, and a Soo line train with 40 passengers that was snowbound at Rexton, 50 miles west of here. The South Shore train after being released proceeded to Sault Ste. Marie but the other was forced to return over the route towards Minneapolis.

Ask Full Report Of Duce's Speech

VIENNA, March 5 (AP)—Premier Seipel today ordered from Rome a full stenographic report of Mussolini's speech of Saturday on the "Tyrolean question." He summoned the foreign relations committee of the Austrian parliament to meet on Wednesday of this week.

FIRE DAMAGE \$3,000

PORTLAND, Ore., Mar. 5 (AP)—Fire, which threatened the entire barnyard plant of the Hammussen Paint company on Linton road, about half way between Portland and Linton, damaged the building and contents to the extent of \$3,000. Prompt work of employees, fire department officials declared, averted what might have been a disastrous blaze.

D'ANNUNZIO IMPROVED

ROME, March 5 (AP)—The latest reports from Gardone state that Gabriella D'Annunzio, Italy's poet-soldier, is recovering from an attack of bronchitis.

The fact, however, that he has not sent any message of condolence on the recent death of Marshal Diaz or caused a wreath to be laid on the tomb in his name is interpreted here as indicating that his doctors have kept the news of his death from him because of his weakened condition.

FAVORS PRISON TERMS

WASHINGTON, March 5 (AP)—A prison sentence for former members of congress engaging in lobbying within two years from the date of their retirement from the senate or house was asked in a bill drafted for introduction today by Representative Howard, democrat, Nebraska.

Church Observes An "Irish Night"

NEW YORK, March 5 (AP)—It was "Irish night" at Grace Methodist Episcopal church last night and the speaker of the evening was Mayor James J. Walker, who talked tolerance, transit and heaven and got acquainted with the Methodists.

"I never believed," he said, "at one time, that there was as much laughter in all the Methodists in the world as I heard tonight. I had at one time believed a Methodist to be a person who did not know how to laugh. Where did I get this idea? Why have I had this conception about people I didn't know?"

In telling of his trip to Ireland, Mayor Walker said there was no religious intolerance in Ireland. "Religious prejudice exists in America but not in Ireland," he said.
