BAKER LOSES
FINAL GAME
TO WALLOWABranch Line Team's Play
Too Aggressive, Speedy
for the BulldogsCONTEST TIED UP
IN THIRD PERIODFifteen Hundred Persons
See Tournament Finals
—Ontario Girls Defeat
Union.Wallowa 26, Baker 22.
The final score of last night's district basketball championship game at Union only tells half of the story—but that half is: The better team won.

The branch line champions played a brand of ball that was unbeatable, as far as the Bulldogs are concerned. Twice the Baker and Wallowa teams have met at Union and each time the northern quintet emerged victorious.

It was a five-man game that the victors used, hinging around a sharpshooting center that was in nearly every play of the evening, occasionally sinking a long shot when the Baker guards were too dense around the basket to work the ball closer. Three of Crawford's mid-floor shots were perfect and those six points represented the margin of Baker's defeat.

Supporting Crawford were two dishing, swift-passing, aggressive forwards and a couple of flashy guards, who time and again broke up the best offensive drives that the copier jockeyed balls could work up. The short, under-handed pass that has confused so many teams during the season was just another way for Wallowa to get the ball last night.

Best Game of Tournney
It would be difficult to pick a star player out of the ten men who participated in last night's contest. Thines, probably, loomed up a little better for Baker than any other. Crawford, by virtue of his remarkable basket shooting, may have had a slight advantage over his team mates. But every man was playing his position the best he knew how and the result was one of the best high school games this district has ever witnessed.

Baker had a little the best of it in the first quarter with their field goals and two converted foul tries. This period ended 3 to 5 in favor of Baker but, coming back with more zip than ever, the branch line quintet tied the score and forged two points ahead in the second quarter before Baker again found the basket. A rally before the end of the half knotted the contest again and the third quarter started with the score 18 all.

In the third quarter the game was even, both teams scoring three field baskets.

Wallowa Speed Wins
Then came the final frame, and Wallowa's ability to speed up the play just a little bit more and Baker's inability to match the pace makers represents the difference in the two fives. Baker only made one field goal in the last period, that by Thines.In the meantime, Lloyd Crawford, Barrett and Johnson were scoring one each.
Nearly two minutes before the gun roared, Wallowa had a clear two-point lead. Instead of resorting to stalling methods, which so many teams do, the champs merely shoved the throttle over another notch and widened the margin two more points.Ontario Girls Win
As a preliminary to the main event of the evening, the Ontario and Union girls' sextets played an interesting contest. The Southeastern Oregon team winning 34 to 22, after a Union rally cut down a seven-point lead in the last half. In the first half Ontario scored 20 points to Union's 13 but the home team spurted and nearly tied the score before the end of the contest.The girls' game involved no championship, merely being between two representative sextets.
Both teams played a fast, aggressive type of ball but the Ontario forwards were a bit more accurate in their basket shooting.1,500 Witness Contests
The Union gymnasium was crowded to capacity for the games, approximately 1,500 passing through the gate. After the Wallowa-

TERRORISM
GRIPS CHINAWholesale Exodus of Refugees
Under Way in
North KwangtungTHOUSANDS SLAIN.
DISPATCHES SAYCommunists Threatening
to Advance on Canton—
Government Mobilizing
Its Troops.

PEKING, March 6 (AP)—Of-ficial and other dispatches from Swatow describe an intensification of communist terrorism in the country districts in Northeastern Kwangtung, causing the wholesale exodus of refugees toward Swatow and to the sea.

It is estimated that there are 50,000 refugees in Swatow. Streets are thronged with men, women and children fleeing misery, giving the city the appearance of the black sea cities to which the white Russians fled after the bolshevik revolution. All steamers going to Indo-China and the Dutch Indies are said to be crowded with refugees.

Town Exterminated
The dispatches state that reliable information indicates that an entire town of several thousand inhabitants, mostly Roman Catholics, in the region of Hweilshien, southeast of Swatow, was exterminated by the communists, the alleged reason being because they were Christians.

The country districts near Swatow are believed to have been stricken the hardest, but other terror is reported from the southern and central provinces and dispatches saying that the authorities (Continued on Page 5)

IBN SAUD BEGINS
WAR AGAINST IRAKGreat Britain Awaiting
Developments with Con-
siderable Anxiety

LONDON, Mar. 6 (AP)—An Exchange Telegraph dispatch from Jerusalem says that it was unofficially announced today that Ibn Saud, king of Nejd, has declared war on the neighboring countries of Iraq and Trans-Jordan.

LONDON, Mar. 6 (AP)—Great Britain today awaited with some anxiety the next move of Abdul Aziz Ibn Saud, sultan of Nejd and Hedjaz, knowing from past experience what indefatigable fighters the Arabs are.
Ibn Saud is quoted as having said that it is impossible to bring the "infidels" of the British mandated territories of Kuwait, Iraq and Trans-Jordan to his sect of Islam by peaceful methods and therefore decided to take up the sword.

If Ibn Saud should descend upon these kingdoms with his 20,000 followers, scattered British forces would be called upon to hold them in check. Three small British warships in Kuwait bay, at the head of the Persian gulf, a British air force in Iraq and various outposts would bear the brunt of the job.

In this region Colonel T. E. Lawrence, with a price on his head, organized the Arabs to drive the Turks out of Syria during the war and made Emir Feisal king of Iraq.

Lowden Concedes He Is Candidate
But Plans No Active Campaign

CHICAGO, Mar. 6 (AP)—Frank O. Lowden, Illinois' war governor, was ready to concede today that he had been made a candidate for the republican presidential nomination, but at the same time he gave no indication of any present intention of making an active campaign for the place. Back from a month's vacation in Arizona, Mr. Lowden said that the filing of his name in the North Dakota primaries "probably makes me a candidate."

SALT LAKE CITY, Utah, Mar. 6 (AP)—Full of optimism over democratic prospects in the coming election, Senator Reed, of Missouri, turned home from the far west today and the pioneer presidential campaign of 1928.

"There has not been a time since the first election of Woodrow Wilson," he told party leaders gathered here, "when I have seen such a spirit of determination to elect a democrat."

E. D. Jasper Not
A Candidate For
Seat In SenateFriends Believe Colon R.
Eberhard Will Enter
Primaries—Two Men-
tioned in Wallowa.

Politics in this section took on a new angle today when E. D. Jasper, whose name has been mentioned in connection with the republican nomination for state senator from Union and Wallowa counties declared that he did not intend to run for the office. "My attitude at the present time is that I will not be a candidate," Mr. Jasper told The Observer early this afternoon.

Colon R. Eberhard, who represents the republican party on the ballot at the last election, has been mentioned for the nomination again although friends of his feel confident that he will enter the race, he was not ready to make any statement today in reference to the matter.

Senator A. R. Hunter, who is now finishing the unexpired term of Bruce Dennis, being elected to the office on the democratic ticket has expressed his intentions of being a candidate for re-election. So far there is no indication that he will have opposition in the primaries, May 15.

Two Mentioned
C. A. Hunter, joint representative from Union and Wallowa counties has declared that he will not be a candidate again this year, having served as representative for many years, and two county men have been mentioned for the office. There is a movement on foot, fostered by friends of Orin Campbell, superintendent of schools at Wallowa and formerly a school superintendent at Joseph, to get him on the republican ballot. Several of these friends have been interviewing La Grande republicans during the past few days. So far as is known G. W. Franklin, of Wallowa, is the only democrat mentioned for the office.Legion, Auxiliary

EL PORTAL, Cal., Mar. 6 (AP)—Three Indian children were drowned and an Indian woman narrowly escaped the same fate when they fell from the peak of a cable while trying hurriedly to cross the Merced river last night to escape from a purported drunken orgy at their ranch, participated in by Indian men.

The dead: Margaret Oliver, 2 months old; Mary Jane Oliver, 2 years old; and Billy Wilson Jr., 5 years old. Margaret and Mary Jane are children of Mrs. Hazel Oliver, who reached the other side of the river in safety. Mrs. Lena Wilson, mother of Billy, fell into the raging river and was rescued by Virgil Brown.

Fireworks Factory
Blast Kills Score

SMARANG, Java, Mar. 6 (AP)—At least a score of persons were killed and more than 100 houses destroyed by the explosion of a fireworks factory at Kodong, near here today.

Twenty bodies have been taken from the debris. Fifty persons are known to have been injured. The explosion caused damage over a wide area.

Police Find No
Flaws In Alibi
Of Dr. Clement

NEW YORK, Mar. 6 (AP)—An alibi established by Louis Clement has convinced police that it would have been impossible for him to have been near Bernardville, N. J. when Miss Margaret Brown, Park Avenue governess, was beaten and burned to death on Feb. 20.

Clement surrendered to police yesterday after authorities publicly had assured him they had no evidence connecting him with the killing. After long hours of questioning police said a check up of his story proved his alibi.

Psychology Of
Red Man Figures
In Murder Trial

ALTURAS, Cal., Mar. 6 (AP)—Indian psychology which causes the red man to take another's word at face value, has been made the basis of the defense of Cassie Turner, Indian girl who was called before the white man's tribunal here today to answer for the slaying of Robert DeClute.

The girl, who calmly accepted the challenge of DeClute to kill him when he found that he could not win her love, is charged with manslaughter. Her story of the affair was simple:
"He asked me to marry him. And when I refused, he asked me to shoot him. He rolled a cigarette while he was telling me how to use the gun. I pulled the trigger and went away."

A half burned cigarette dropped from the dead man's lips when the body was found.

Jake Sharp, veteran Northern California attorney who came out of retirement to defend Cassie, announced he would contend that DeClute knew enough of Indian psychology to realize that the girl would comply with his strange request with the same willingness as she would "give him a drink of water."

Issue Arrest
Warrant For
R. W. STEWART

WASHINGTON, March 6 (AP)—A warrant for arrest of Robert W. Stewart, chairman of the board of Standard Oil company of Indiana indicted here for refusing to answer questions asked by the senate.

The warrant was accompanied by a certified copy of the indictment, which charged Stewart was guilty of four counts of violating section 192 of the criminal code. This section makes it a misdemeanor to refuse to answer questions before a senate committee that are pertinent to the subject under inquiry.

Farm Relief Bill
Amendment Okehd

WASHINGTON, March 6 (AP)—In its first consideration of the revised McNary-Haugen farm relief bill under procedure permitting amendment the house agricultural committee today tentatively approved a motion to give farm organizations the right to express a preference concerning the membership of the federal farm board the measure would create.

The motion, offered by Representative Kincheloe, democrat, Kentucky, was adopted by a 12 to 9 vote, but with the understanding that it could be reconsidered later. The question of selection of membership for the farm board was one of the major difficulties that developed last year between congress and President Coolidge.

DUNNE MEASURES
ARE FILED TODAYBills Designed to Reduce
Auto Fees and Increase
Gasoline Tax

SALEM, March 6 (AP)—A measure designed to reduce motor vehicle license fees, another to increase gasoline taxes and a third designed to prevent the legislature from interfering with these or other initiative measures are being initiated by State Senator Jon E. Dunne, of Portland, and all were filed today with the secretary of state. They will be submitted to the attorney general for ballot title prior to the circulation of petitions.

The range of fees under the license reduction bill is for \$10 for the lightest passenger cars to \$173 for the heaviest trucks. Up to April 1 the full fee would be paid. Between April 1 and July 1 three-fourths would be paid, between July 1 and October 1 one-half and after October 1 one-fourth, but in no case would less than \$5 be paid.

Vehicles with solid tires would pay 25 per cent in addition to the regular fee and common carries would pay \$15 in addition. This would repeal the present fees under the motor vehicle transportation act and would use the \$15 additional to turn over to the public service commission to a maximum of \$45,000 for administration that year. Of the remainder half would go to the highway fund and half to the counties instead of the present three-fourths and one-fourth. The measure would be effective Jan. 1, 1929.

The gasoline tax act would add two cents to the act of 1923, which levied two cents. This increase with the one-cent tax of 1921 would make a total tax of five cents a gallon. The highway commission would, in its discretion, apply one-fourth of the proceeds to aiding counties in the construction of market roads. The remainder would go to the state highway fund.

The third measure is a proposed constitutional amendment which would prohibit the legislature from amending or repealing any act initiated and passed by the people. It is practically identical with an other measure already filed by the state federation of labor for the state senate and the Oregon railway conductors.

Hammer Slayer
Will Serve Life
Term In PrisonVelma West, 21, Pleads
Guilty to Second Degree
Murder in Painesville,
Ohio.PAINESVILLE, Ohio, Mar. 6 (AP)—Velma West, 21-year-old hammer slayer of her young husband, Thomas Edward West, was sentenced to life imprisonment in Marysville reformatory today a few minutes after she had pleaded guilty to second degree murder.
The girl received the sentence in tears. She slumped into her chair after a few brief remarks by Common Pleas Judge J. D. Barnes, and her father, B. L. Van Woert, of Cleveland, rushed to her side. Her mother was not in court to hear the sentence.

When court was convened at 9:30 a. m. Judge Barnes asked if an agreement had been reached between counsel.

State Agrees
Defense Attorney Francis W. Poulson, informed the court that Velma was willing to plead guilty to second degree murder, thus obviating the necessity of standing trial on a first degree charge.
Prosecutor Seth Paulin then told Judge Barnes the state had thoroughly considered the plea and had agreed to accept it.

Velma, attired in the same sombre outfit of black which she wore in court yesterday, rose from her seat at the counsel table and stepped before the dias.

"I understand your counsel has asked to enter a plea of guilty to second degree murder," said Judge Barnes addressing the defendant. "Is that so?"

"Yes, sir," replied Velma in a scarcely audible tone.

"Having entered such a plea, the law requires that I ask you if you have anything to say as to why sentence should not be imposed," said the judge.

The girl replied that she had nothing to say.
"Therefore, the court directs you to spend the remainder of your natural life in the Marysville reformatory for women, as part of which shall be spent in solitary confinement."The girl wavered as the judge finished his address to her.
Breaking into tears, she dropped into her chair and her father rushed to her side.

Judge Barnes then ordered the court room cleared and a few minutes later Velma was returned to the jail to await her trip to Marysville.

Committee Vote
10 to 7 Against
Esch NominationWASHINGTON, Mar. 5 (AP)—An unfavorable report on the re-nomination of John W. Esch, of Wisconsin, as a member of the interstate commerce commission, was ordered today by the senate interstate commerce committee.
The vote was 7 for and 10 against.

Esch's nomination was opposed particularly by senators from the southern coal states, because of his change of vote in the Lake Cargo coal case whereby the railroads serving the Pennsylvania mines were permitted to reduce their rates to lake ports, thus increasing the differential in favor of the Pennsylvania fields as against the mines of West Virginia, against the mines of West Virginia.

Ohio Bank Robbed
Of \$30,000 Today

COLUMBUS, Ohio, Mar. 6 (AP)—Four men robbed the Columbus Savings bank at the edge of the downtown district of \$30,000 today. The robbers entered the lobby carrying sawed off shotguns and forced Benjamin S. Dickson, president and cashier, four employees and five customers into a back room.

Then they climbed over the teller's cage, scooped all the cash within reach and fled.

BAKER, March 6 (AP)—High ranking clergymen of the Catholic church of the Pacific coast were here today for the consecration of the Rev. Edward J. Kelly as bishop of Boise. The ceremony here today was preliminary to his installation which will be held at the cathedral of St. John the Evangelist at Boise, Thursday.

The Rt. Rev. Joseph F. McGrath, bishop of Baker, was consecrating prelate, assisted by the Rt. Rev. Matthias C. Enihan, bishop of Great Falls, Mont., and the Rt. Rev. Edward J. O'Dea, bishop of Seattle, as co-consecrators. The Most Rev. Edward D. Howard, archbishop of Oregon City and metropolitan of the province, embracing Oregon, Washington, Idaho and Montana; the Most Rev. Edward J. Hanna, archbishop of San Francisco; the Rt. Rev. Thomas O'Donnell, bishop of Victoria; and the Rt. Rev. Charles D. White, bishop of Spokane, were among the prelates present.

Procession at 9:30
St. Francis cathedral was opened at 9:30 and the ceremony of consecration began with a procession at 9:30 o'clock. The clergymen will proceed to Boise tomorrow by special train for the installation.

TEN BURN TO
DEATH IN FIRE
NEAR QUEBEC

QUEBEC, March 6 (AP)—Ten persons lost their lives in a fire which destroyed the home of Thomas Cliehe in the Parish of Ste. Marie du Beauce last night. Mrs. Cliehe died in a vain attempt to rescue some of her eight children who were trapped in the blazing house.

Cliehe, who with his wife, dashed from the house in their night clothing to give the alarm, also tried to re-enter the dwelling but was driven back to the flames. Mrs. Cliehe climbed through a window and was not seen again.
Charles Cliehe, father of Thomas, was sleeping on the top floor of the building and was believed to have been suffocated in his sleep. While neighbors combed the smoldering ruins this morning for the bodies, investigators held the theory that an overheated furnace was responsible for the fire.

Bedford, Ind., Mar. 6 (AP)—Mrs. Pearl Stewart, 24, and two of her children, Viola May, 5, and Red Albert, 3, were burned to death today when their farm home was destroyed by fire.

Chisholm Views
Canal and Weeps

INDIANA HARBOR, Ind., Mar. 6 (AP)—George Chisholm, who drowned two of his three sons in the Indiana Harbor ship canal, today saw the spot from which he entombed he pushed them into the water as he was being transferred to the county jail at Crown Point. He sobbed when he realized where he was.

Chisholm was taken to Crown Point to await action of a special grand jury which will be asked to indict him Monday.
Chisholm's attorney is building an insanity defense.
