Lee plays the sheriff whose vigilante methods so nearly result in another tragedy.

It is the best picture Jack Padjan has made since he became a star and promises well for his future in Western films. He is revealed as a hard riding hard fisted cowboy with a quiet humor which is most infectious.

One of the most exciting scenes is that in which he and his horse alongside a four-horse team which is running away, jumping astride of one of the leaders in an effort to stop the terrified animals and save the life of the frightened girl who is driving them.
