## Stunt Airman At Star In Sky High Picture

Al Wilson, the screen's most noted stunt and trick aviator, experienced the most terrifying episode of his flying career while staging a wrestling match and flat duel on the wing of an airplane for a sequence in "Sky High Saunders," the triumph Western Star theater tonight for the last time.
