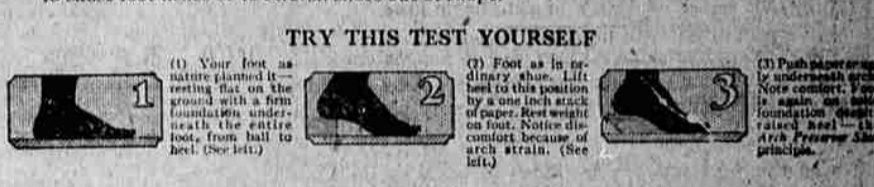
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LUNCHEON — Beef broth with carrot dumplings, apple sauce, raisin bread, coconut potato pudding, milk, tea.

DINNER—Stuffed baked sparrows, candied sweet potatoes, combination cabbage salad, canned pears, fudge cake, milk, coffee.

These are all simple, inexpensive menus calculated not to make too large a hole in the housekeeper's budget.

2 The sparrows are stuffed with a meat and vegetable force-meat. The combination makes a savory dish sure to be "relished" on a formidable late-winter evening.

Cocoanut tapioca pudding is good with fresh grated or canned cocoanut.

Cocoanut Tapioca Pudding  
Three tablespoons quick cooking tapioca, 2 tablespoons cornmeal, 1/2 cup grated cocoanut, 1/4 teaspoon salt, 2 1/2 cups milk, 1/4 cup brown sugar.

Heat milk in double boiler. Mix tapioca, cornmeal, cocoanut, sugar and salt and stir into hot milk. Cook over hot water until mixture thickens. Turn into a buttered baking dish and bake 45 minutes in a moderate oven. Chill and serve with plain cream.
