General Motors
Makes Fifth New
Record in 5 Days

NEW YORK, Mar. 8 (AP)—After reaching \$151.50 today, the fifth new record in five days, General Motors common dropped back to \$150, yesterday's close on the New York stock exchange, and wound up the session at \$150.50. Speculative interest shifted to oil and public utility shares, several of which reached new high ground.

The closing was strong. Some of the "blue chip" stocks ran up fast in the final hour. Dupont, Midland Steel Products preferred and National Surety gained 5 to 7 points. Oils continued to record better figures and General Motors managed to get above 151 again. Total sales approximated 2,100,000 shares.

CHICAGO, Mar. 8 (AP)—Opening 1/4 to 1/2c off, Chicago wheat later held near to initial figures. Corn and oats were relatively firm, corn starting 1/4 to 3/8c down, but afterwards scoring some advance. Provisions tended to sag.

Wheat closed unsettled, 1/4 to 3/8c net lower, corn unchanged to 3/8c up, oats 1/4 to 1/2c off, and provisions unchanged to 17 1/2c down.
