MENUS

By Sister Mary
BREAKFAST—Stewed flax, cereal, cream, creamed bacon and eggs on toast, extra toast, milk, coffee.

LUNCHEON—Spinach and mushrooms on toast, ruskin bread, sliced bananas with cream, ginger snaps, milk, tea.
DINNER—Pork chops and apples in casserole, twice baked potatoes, buttered cauliflower, pear and cream cheese salad, jelly roll, milk, coffee.

The combination of bananas and ginger snaps is particularly good. To serve the fruit in perfectly ripe and scrape off the rough coating after peeling. Slice and serve at once with a light sprinkling of sugar and plain cream and ginger snaps. Even a four-year-old child may be given this dessert since the ginger snaps themselves are rich in molasses.

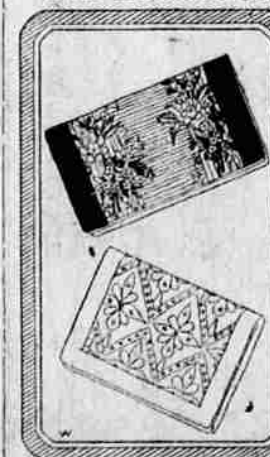
Raisin Bread
One-half cup molasses, 1 tablespoon lard, 1 teaspoon salt, ¼ cup boiling water, 1 yeast cake, ¾ cup lukewarm water, 2 cups graham flour, 1 cup white flour, 1 cup seeded and chopped raisins.

Mix molasses, lard, salt and boiling water. Blend thoroughly and let stand until lukewarm. Dissolve yeast cake in lukewarm water and add to first mixture. Mix graham and white flours and gradually add ingredients to liquid, beating well. Add raisins and beat hard. Cover and let rise in a warm place until double in bulk. Beat again and turn into a buttered bread pan. Cover and let rise in a warm place until again double in bulk. Bake one hour in a moderately hot oven.

Warm or fresh bread cuts more smoothly and easily with a hot knife. The knife is heated by dipping into boiling water or holding over a flame.

Bridge Pointers

CONTRACT BRIDGE

Yesterday we explained the strength necessary to warrant jumping a partner's untested Trumps to three No Trumps, and explained the theories which justify the advice given. A few examples may help to clarify.

No. 1	No. 2

In Nos. 1, 2 and 3 there is no doubt as to the soundness of the jump. There is an honor count of 6 in each; and each has in addition a Ten which is an "added attraction" although not an essential. To pass with any one of these probably would be throwing away a game as, opposite any sound two-No-Trump bid, it probably would furnish the strength required to make three-odd.

A Queen or a Jack with only small cards supporting it is not seemingly of great value, and as assistance for a partner's suit-bid should not be estimated too highly; but opposite a partner who has bid No Trump, and especially opposite a partner who has bid two No Trumps, Q-X-X or J-X-X or even Q-X or J-X is apt to furnish exactly the "rigger" most needed.

Hand No. 4 as was explained yesterday, is a close case. At times when the two No Trumps have been bid with a minimum holding; it will not size up to the requirement; but it will do so more frequently than it will fall short and therefore it is recommended.

The following table, which summarizes the strength required for No Trump jumps, doubtless will prove to be of considerable value. It is based on the count of Ace 4, King 3, Queen 2, and Jack 1. Its use in actual play is earnestly recommended.

Minimum Counts for no Trump Jumps of Partner's Untested No Trump.

Jump from one to two—Two Aces, or any count of 9.

Jump from one to three—A count of 12 or 13.

Jump from two to three—An Ace, a King-Queen or any count of 9. (Copyright John F. Dille Co.)
