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ASK BIDS FOR
STATE SHOPS,
DUE MAR. 27Highway Commission to
Receive Offers for Five
New BuildingsWELCOME NEWS
TO LA GRANDEThree Timber Frame and
Two Brick Structures
to Be Erected on East
Adams Avenue.

Welcome news to La Grande arrived here this morning with the announcement from the Oregon state highway commission that sealed bids would be received in Portland at 10 a. m. Tuesday, Mar. 27, for the construction of buildings on state property in La Grande. The announcement was made by Roy A. Klein, state highway engineer.

The advertisement for bids announces that three timber frame buildings, all of large size, and two brick buildings, slightly smaller, will be erected.

The timber frame buildings' dimensions are as follows: 34 by 144 feet, 76 by 168 feet and 48 by 120 feet. The brick buildings will be 34 by 76 feet and 37 by 60 feet.

Plans and specifications may be obtained at the office of H. G. Smith, state highway engineer, in La Grande.

This announcement is received with great interest here, as it will mark the beginning of the construction of permanent highway department shops in Eastern Oregon, recently purchased through co-operation of the city, county and state. The site selected is known as the Toy Young property, title to the tract of land was given to the state.

75 TEACHERS
HEAR TALK BY
PORTLAND MAN

All of the teachers of the La Grande public school system, 75 in number, attended the meeting of classroom teachers which was held in the high school auditorium yesterday afternoon after school. H. G. Scott, of Portland, national secretary of the department of classroom teachers of the National Educational association, was the speaker, and he gave an interesting talk regarding the classroom teachers' association and told of his recent trip to Boston where he attended a meeting of the association. He suggested that a classroom teachers' association be organized in La Grande, however, no action toward organization was taken during yesterday's meeting.

Harold M. Phinney, a teacher in the central school here, presided over the meeting and introduced the speaker. Mr. Scott left at 4 o'clock for his home in Portland. He is a teacher in one of the Portland high schools.

Dairy Specialist
Holding Meetings

A dairy meeting was held yesterday afternoon at Wolf Creek when N. C. Jamieson, dairy specialist of the Oregon State college extension service addressed the meeting on "Dairy Management." In addition to Mr. Jamieson's talk there was a general discussion on pastures.

A similar meeting is being held in the city hall at Union this afternoon for all dairymen of the county who are interested. The meetings were arranged by H. G. Avery, county agent.

Mr. Jamieson will leave tonight for his home in Corvallis. He has been in Eastern Oregon for several days and attended dairy meetings both in Walla Walla and Baker counties.

County Sends
9 to Pen Since
First Of YearFebruary Term of Court
Results in Five Con-
victions Out of Six Crimi-
nal Cases Tried.

A check of circuit court records reveals that an unusually heavy percentage of convictions of criminal cases resulted in the recently completed February term of circuit court. Five out of six criminal cases tried by District Attorney Carl W. Heller before Judge J. W. Knowles, resulted in convictions—five of the defendants going to the penitentiary. This is conceded by those familiar with the courts to be well above the average. The recently finished term of court included a greater number of criminal than civil cases, several of the latter being settled out of court or postponed until a later term.

A recent figure issued from the penitentiary at Salem shows that the population of the penitentiary is running a wide margin in excess of the estimate—at present the population is 630 as compared to an estimate of 575.

The men found guilty and the sentences they were given by Judge Knowles follow: Robert Bailey, sentenced to two years for the theft of a set of dyed; Joe Soto and Joe McBride, sentenced to two years for the theft of a car from William Sallor; G. C. Hipp, sentenced to three years for burglary not of a private dwelling; C. H. Harrison, sentenced to one year and fined \$100; Walter Mayo, found guilty of non-support of a minor child and paroled on a bond guaranteeing the payment of \$20 a month for the upkeep of his son Wilmer. A. E. McCallum, and Jack Thomas were fined \$100 each for a still and fined \$250. Walter Jensen was sentenced to one year and fined \$100 after he had pled guilty before the judge on charges of possession of a still.

Sheriff Jesse Brechers and his brother, Charles, took four of the men, Harrison, Hipp, Soto and McBride, to Salem in the sheriff's car without the aid of any other officers.

Trapshooters
Shoot at Lone
Tree Tomorrow

The Wing, Pin and Fleetfoot club of La Grande, which dropped from a tie for first to a tie for eighth place last Sunday in the Oregonian telegraphic trapshooting tournament, will face three clubs in tomorrow's leg, to be shot off at the Lone Tree grounds.

In the first round La Grande will endeavor to break more clay pigeons than Union, in the second round Medford will be the opponent and in the third the Washington county club is to be "enemy."

La Grande's present standing is five out of four lost, for a percentage of .555. This puts the club in a tie with Halsey and Enterprise. Medford is in fourth place with a percentage of .750. Union is next to the cellar with .117 and Washington county is well down in the second division with a record of .375.

Officials of the Wing, Pin and Fleetfoot club, who have supervised the building of a new trap house, wind breakers, etc., at the grounds, which should improve the shooting facilities, are hopeful that a large number of scattergun artists will be on hand tomorrow morning at the usual time.

William Baker,
Pioneer, Passes
At Summerville

William Andrew Baker, pioneer of the Grande Ronde valley, died at his home at Summerville this morning after a short illness. Funeral services will be held at the Summerville chapel Sunday afternoon at 1 o'clock with the Rev. J. George Watz, of the La Grande Presbyterian church, officiating. Burial will be in the Summerville cemetery.

Mr. Baker was born Oct. 8, 1852 in Iowa and was 75 years, five months and two days of age at the time of death. He came to Oregon at the age of 17 years and has been a resident of La Grande and Summerville for the past 52 years. He has lived in Summerville for the last 26 years, moving there from La Grande. He is survived by his widow, Lilly C. Baker, and six children.

The body is at the Snodgrass & Zimmerman mortuary.

FOG CAUSES
AVIATOR TO
FLY TO BENDJoe Taft, Airmail Pilot,
Lands Here After a
Perilous JourneyWINTER WHIPPING
EASTERN STATESSnow Is 10 Inches Deep
in Pennsylvania—New
York Has Heavy Snow-
fall, Trains Run Late.

Losing his way because of a blinding fog over Eastern and Central Oregon, Joe Taft, airmail pilot for the Varney company, landed here about 3 o'clock this morning after a three-hour flight out of Pasco, Wash., that carried him to Bend, Ore. before he could get his bearings.

Ordinarily the trip from Pasco to the Grande Ronde valley takes about an hour's time, but Pilot Taft, before he was far along his route, became enmeshed in a blinding fog that made flying conditions extremely perilous. Unable to discover his exact location he continued flying until he located Bend. From that point he was able to return to La Grande, landing at the emergency field south-east of this city.

Pilot Taft decided to wait at the field until weather conditions improved somewhat before continuing his trip to Boise, Ida.

SNOWSTORM IN EAST
NEW YORK, Mar. 10, (AP)—A snowstorm today blanketed regions of the east with one of the heaviest falls of the winter. The fall ranged from fractional amounts to one foot. Temperatures were moderate over most of the region.

'Red' Regime Is
Established In
North KwantungWholesale Murders, Arson
and Other Crimes Com-
mon—Women Are Pro-
claimed Public Property

CANTON, Mar. 10, (AP)—More than 100,000 Chinese, fishermen and salt makers of Northeast Kwantung have "gone red," established a communal government and are attempting to enlarge their sphere of control. This has resulted in a reign of terror—wholesale murders, the burning of villages and the disruption of trade.

The area in which the so-called soviet has been set up is a little more than a hundred miles north of Hongkong around Hong and Hieschenchin bays, and the towns of Hailung and Lukfung are the communists' headquarters.

A Fertile Field
Called by their critics and victims "a mass of freshwaters, ne'er-do-wells and coolies of fortune," and "cousins and brothers" of the pirates of Blas bay, not far away, the leaders are said to have had an easy time getting converts to communism. With the stopping of the long established trade of fishing, farming and salt drying in the turmoil, which has virtually paralyzed the economic activities of South China, communism, the reason says, found a fertile field. The peasants learned much about it, too, from the "red" army that was forced out of Swatow, and said to be backed up by a group of Russian advisers, who are reported to be directing affairs in the district.

These newly-made "reds" have sought to make all things common property. There being no fences or walls enclosing the farms, they ploughed up the paths separating the fields. All title deeds were commandeered and burned. Landlords and merchants, supposed to be men of wealth, were held for ransom and their property confiscated.

Murder Common
In numerous villages murder has become the order of the day. Many wealthy families have been entirely wiped out. A few towns and villages which attempted to resist the red regime have been sacked and razed. In some places the village elders were decapitated, their heads placed on poles and sent to the next settlement as a warning.

29 Killed in Tilt
Near Guadalajara

MEXICO CITY, Mar. 10, (AP)—Dispatches from Guadalajara today said twenty-eight insurgents and one soldier were killed in a number of encounters with government troops. Three insurgents and one soldier were wounded.

The most important of the clashes took place at Villita, near America, where the insurgents when dispersed abandoned twenty dead. Three insurgents were killed and three wounded seriously at Zapotero while five others were killed at Los Chiles in minor engagements with federal troops.

WEST FIGHTS
WET DRIVE IN
THIS STATEDemocratic National
Committeeman Asks for
"Dry" DelegationVERBAL FIRE IS
AIMED AT SMITHSenator Willis Attacks
Hoover in Ohio—Avoids
Using the Name of the
Commerce Head.

PORTLAND, Ore., Mar. 10, (AP)—Oswald West, democratic national committeeman of Oregon, a former governor, today issued a statement in which he urged the "dry" democrats to wake up and don their fighting togs to prevent a "wet" delegation being sent to the democratic national convention.

"Some may think it good politics to offer the party up as a sacrifice on the altar of booze, but I do not," said West.

"Neither do I think the rank and file of the sober law-abiding democrats of this state are in favor of it."

"If a wet plank offers the only prospect of our floating ashore in this campaign then I earnestly hope we will drown at sea."

"Whenever the democratic party reaches a point of decadence where it is willing to line up with the grog shops and the sneak easy against the fireside and home it is time to call for the undertaker, and the sooner the better."

"I trust every dry democrat is alive to the situation and is getting ready to do his duty on election day."

Aims at Al Smith
"Every candidate for delegate should be called upon to declare himself so that the 'wetters' will know just what he stands for."

"This is no time to be fooled by the puppet-footers."

Democrats agreed that West was aiming at the candidacy of Governor Al Smith, of New York. No move has yet been made by any of the democratic presidential candidates to file in Oregon for the primary which is to be held May 18.

Gilbert Hamaker, head of the Tammany society, an avowed Smith leader, has called a meeting for next Wednesday night, after which a decision may be reached in regard to the Smith movement.

WILLIS VS. HOOVER
COLUMBUS, O., Mar. 10, (AP)—Turning from an attack on Herbert Hoover, his opponent in the Ohio primaries, Senator Frank B. Willis in an address here today assailed certain newspapers which he contended were trying to dictate whom the republican party should nominate for president.

He did not refer in his prepared speech to the newspapers by name, but the context of his remarks showed clearly that he meant the Scripps-Howard chain.

Also in his prepared address, Mr. Willis refrained from using the name of the commerce secretary, who is in the field against him for dates to file in Oregon for the Kansas City convention. But he managed, without being so specific, to re-emphasize his contention that Mr. Hoover is "internationally minded," a believer in the league of nations, and out of sympathy with the orthodox republican views on the tariff.

Tri-County Legion
Council Planned

A tri-county council of the American Legion may be organized soon. It was announced today by Raymond O. Williams, chairman of a local legion committee delegated to work toward that end. Mr. Williams believes that such an organization, which would be the first of its kind for Walla Walla, Union and Baker counties, will probably be effected very soon. A Union county council has existed, but never a joint county council, he explained. The council, if organized, will meet alternately at all the cities of the council and will have as its chief purpose the stimulation of co-operation and friendly feeling between the counties.

"We are eager to see the council formed as we believe it will be a benefit to very post," declared Mr. Williams.

Snake Charmer
Sparks Daughter;
Goes to Jail

KANSAS CITY, Kan., Mar. 10, (AP)—Placing her diamonds in custody of her husband, Mrs. Christine Woodside, 24, former snake charmer and lion tamer in a carnival has pleaded to spend 30 days in the workhouse rather than pay a \$100 fine imposed for spanking her 16-year-old daughter, Lorene Jones.

Arraigned here last night, the mother admitted spanking the girl Sunday with a coat hanger. She said Lorene refused to give an account of a trip she made in the family automobile.

"Parents have a right to punish their children, but they have no right to be brutal," Judge Fred H. White said in imposing sentence. "I'll not crawlfish, judge," replied Mrs. Woodside. "I'll go to jail first. That will be as hard on Lorene as it will on me."

COOLIDGE SIGNS
ALIEN MEASUREProvides for Settlement
of the American Claims
Against Germany

WASHINGTON, Mar. 10, (AP)—President Coolidge today signed the alien property bill, providing for settlement of American claims against Germany and for the return of seized property.

It had been disclosed previously that President Coolidge did not regard the bill as satisfactory as the one which was recommended by the treasury. He did not like the proposal that salaries of the drafting clerk of the senate and house and some treasury officials be raised.

The bill authorizes a final appropriation of \$100,000,000, German and Austro-Hungarian claims of \$100,000 or under will be settled in full and claims of greater value will be settled immediately to the extent of 80 per cent.

The claims covered by the alien property bill which the United States will reimburse fall principally under the categories of ships seized during the war, and of patent rights.

Fire Loss Figured
At About \$131,000

SALEM, Ore., Mar. 10, (AP)—The fire loss in Oregon outside of Portland during February was \$134,161, according to the monthly report of Clara A. Lee, state insurance commissioner. The heaviest losses were a fire in Marion county that destroyed a barn and contents with a loss of \$15,000; a fire in the Marion hotel here with a loss of \$20,000 and a \$20,000 fire that destroyed a store at Silver Lake.

SANDE UNDER KNIFE

NEW YORK, Mar. 10, (AP)—Hed Sande, famous jockey, is at Roosevelt hospital convalescing from an operation. Sande was admitted to the hospital Tuesday and underwent an operation Thursday. The nature of his illness was not disclosed. He was reported to be resting comfortably.

PENDLETON, Mar. 10, (AP)—Tom Gurdane, chief of police of Pendleton and one of the captors of William Edward Hickman, today announced his candidacy for the republican nomination for sheriff of Umatilla county in the May primaries. Gurdane, detained in Los Angeles, wired his announcement to Pendleton friends.

160 Passengers
Taken Off Ship;
Two Lives LostCoast Guardsmen Die in
Rescue Attempt; Two
More, Suffering from
Cold, May Succumb.

PLYMOUTH, Mass., Mar. 10, (AP)—All the 150 passengers of the stranded steamer Robert E. Lee were landed safely here today. An hour after the first boat had brought 64 of them ashore a second boat brought the remainder.

The captain and all but a few members of the crew left the vessel and boarded the navy tug Red Wing to be taken to Boston.

Two coast guardsmen lost their lives in an attempt to go to the assistance of the wrecked steamer this morning. Two others, suffering from immersion and exposure were expected to die.

The first passengers brought to land were in good condition except that nearly all were suffering from exposure and hunger. They were removed to the Plymouth Rock House near the pier where the local chapter of the Red Cross had made provision for them.

The seas were running high about the Mary Ann Rocks on which the Robert E. Lee was held fast and the transfer of the passengers was attended by grave danger. Nine rescue boats were standing by.

PLYMOUTH, Mass., Mar. 10, (AP)—Two coast guardsmen, believed to be William H. Cashman, acting captain at the Manomet station, and a nursemaid, a Frank Ciriawald, lost their lives today when their surf boat was capsized by the high seas about 1,000 yards from shore.

Together with the crew, either six or seven men, saved themselves by clinging to the overturned craft for a half hour as the high waves washed it ashore.

JAP VESSEL IN DANGER
TOKYO, Mar. 10, (AP)—The Japanese steamer Koryu Maru out of Vancouver Feb. 17 and carrying lumber, has gone around ten miles off Inubosaki point in the prefecture of Chiba in a heavy storm.

Storm conditions made rescue of her crew of 43 men impossible at present but the Japanese navy is sending a destroyer to the scene.

Edward Larson
Sentenced To
15 Years in Pen

ROSEBURG, Ore., Mar. 10, (AP)—Edward Larson, convicted in the circuit court on vice charges involving several boys in Roseburg and nearby vicinity, was given the maximum sentence of 15 years in the state penitentiary by Judge Hamilton this morning. The judge stated that he could imagine no case more corrupt or depraved and that the court would consider nothing other than the maximum penalty that could be imposed under the law. Larson is to be taken to Salem this afternoon.

No Sentence Today
Following the reading of the verdict, Judge Elliott Craig declared that since it was a few minutes after 12 noon Saturday, he could not sentence Hickman today. He set the date of sentence as Tuesday, March 13.

Deputy District Attorney Costello announced that additional robbery charges would be filed against both Hickman and Hunt.

Walsh jumped to his feet when Costello made the announcement and declared that Hickman would plead guilty as fast as the charges were filed.

200 Killed By
Landslide Near
Santos, Brazil

RIO JANEIRO, Brazil, Mar. 10, (AP)—Newspaper reports from Santos say that more than 200 persons are estimated to have been killed today in a landslide in Montserrat, which buried many houses and streets.

The estimate of casualties was made by Cordeiro de Mello, a local newspaper, after a telephone inquiry to the newspaper Commercio de Santos. The latter paper said that more than twenty bodies had been removed from the buried area.

Part of Montserrat, which is in the central part of Santos, began slipping this morning.

FITS HOLD UP
WALLA WALLA
MURDER TRIAL

WALLA WALLA, Wash., Mar. 10, (AP)—Epileptic fits suffered by Preston Ray Clark this morning caused a postponement of his trial and that of Mrs. Boswell Mae Bidwell for the murder of her husband, Alpheus Bidwell.

Superior Judge Sharpsteen who was prepared to read his instructions to the jury at 9:30 waited for half an hour for Clark's seizures to subside to permit him to enter court, and then adjourned the trial until 1 p. m.

Similar attacks during recess yesterday afternoon caused an adjournment at 7:30 o'clock last night when rebuttal witnesses were called and both sides completed their cases.

LONGVIEW, Wash., Mar. 10, (AP)—Two searching parties combing different areas of Cowlitz county failed to find trace of Victor Stone, missing right of way worker, or of Frank S. James, aged retired business man, who dropped from sight Wednesday.

HICKMAN AND
HUNT GUILTY
OF SLAYINGJury Recommends Life
Imprisonment for Both
the DefendantsNEW SANITY PLEA
TO BE PRESENTEDHunt to Be Sentenced
Tuesday, March 13—
Trial Aftermath of Ma-
rian Parker Case.

HALL OF JUSTICE, Los Angeles, Mar. 10, (AP)—The jury of six men and six women today found William Edward Hickman and Wally Hunt guilty of the murder of C. Ivy Toms and recommended life imprisonment for both.

Attorneys for both defendants announced that they would appeal the verdict.

Date of sentencing of Hunt was fixed as Tuesday, March 13. Hickman will be sentenced on a similar date after a hearing on a sanity plea.

Jerome Walsh, Hickman's attorney, waived the 48-hour statute and requested the court to sentence Hickman at once.

Trial Aftermath
The trial that closed today was the aftermath of another case which has been characterized as one of the most gruesome in western police annals, the kidnapping, slaying and mutilating of a little school girl, Marian Parker, for which Hickman was sentenced to death several weeks ago.

When the mutilated body of Marian Parker was tossed at the feet of her father, last December 15 in return for \$1,000 ransom money, thousands were thrown in to the great manhunt, and scouring the countryside in vain for two days before science in the form of a fingerprint expert, determined that the killer wanted was Hickman.

The jury withheld decision in the matter of sentencing Hickman. On a motion made by Attorney Walsh the jury was again sworn in and he rested his case relative to Hickman's sanity. The prosecution waived and the case went to the jury. The court instructed the jurors, as they filed out of the court room this time to determine whether or
