MEDFORD, Ore., Mar. 10 (AP)—Medford won a clear title to the right to represent the Southern Oregon district in the state basketball tournament by defeating Central Point 26 to 13 last night in a game that resembled football at times. During the first half, three Central Point players were removed on personal fouls. The score at the end of the half was 15 to 12 in favor of Medford.

In the second half, the locals stalled the entire third quarter, not a Central Point player touching the ball. The same tactics continued in the final period, enlivened by breaks for the basket.

The Central Point team won 12 straight victories in the secondary league and after each victory challenged Medford; the game finally being ordered by the state association.

Farm Pointers

The growing dairy industry in the south will find a valuable aid in the velvet bean. Silage made by mixing the velvet bean with corn is much better than silage made from corn alone. The velvet bean also is of high value as a soil-improving crop in rotation with either corn or cotton. It may be planted in the row with corn, the mixture affording first class grazing from late fall until early spring.

When plants begin to grow in the spring, black stem rust of wheat is blown from the old stubble and straw to the leaves of barley bushes, where it multiplies. It is then blown back to the wheat, where it continues to multiply and spread. The rust saps the vitality of the plants and ruins the yield. If there is no barley bush for the growth of the spring stage of rust it means death to the rust and life to the wheat.

Logs may be sold by sizes and grades or without classification by the lot. Selling "log run" is simple and direct, but offers good opportunity for speculators, the advantage usually going to the buyer, whose knowledge is better than that of the seller. Selling by sizes and grades, when these are defined in the contract, often results in larger money returns.

Hops, as the busy seasons as harvesters. "Hogging down" corn is easier and often more profitable than husking and feeding in the lot. In a corn field planned for harvest by hogs it is well to plant soybeans with the corn or to sow rape at the time of the last cultivation. Soybeans in the field in a large measure will take the place of tankage.

Too frequently a carload of grain is shipped to a terminal market and sold, only to be shipped back into the territory where it originated. This means two heavy payments for freight when one light payment might have served. Greater efficiency in methods of distribution, particularly on the part of farmers' elevator companies, might effect material savings in such matters.

La Grande Music Lovers To Hear Opera Company

A number of La Grande people will go to Portland when the world famous Chicago Civic Opera company will open its Portland engagement at the Public Auditorium March 22 with the opera "Aida." The second night will be "Snow Maiden" in English, the Saturday matinee "Resurrection" and Saturday night "Il Trovatore." Local people are now receiving their ticket reservations.

Portland is all worked up over the prospects of the opera season, the first in four years. The engagement has been made possible by 100 citizens signing a guarantee to cover a part of the cost of bringing the opera aggregation across the country. Portland's share of the cost being \$2,500. The company of 200 persons is coming in three special trains, two carrying the 40 world-famous opera stars. The 55-piece orchestra with three world noted conductors; the ballet, the chorus and the 50 stage hands and electricians. The third carries the scenery and equipment in 15 baggage cars. The railroad cost of moving the company is in excess of \$200,000.

On the present tour the company which is the plaything of a group of millionaires of Chicago, will gross about \$250,000 even if every seat at every performance is sold. The company lost \$400,000 in its Chicago season this year (even though seats were at a premium) at almost every performance during the season.

The seat sale has been opened in Portland at Sherman Uby's Music store. Arrangements have to be made whereby one of town patrons may order tickets by mail or directly by long distance telephone or by telegraph.

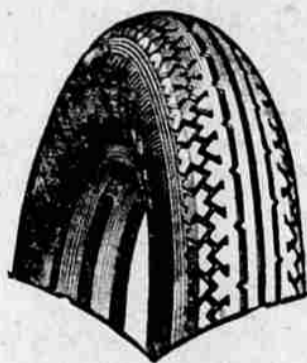

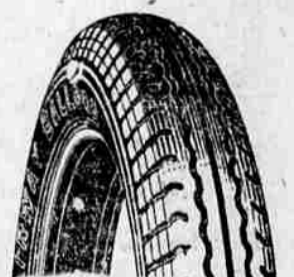
