140 RUNNERS IN PYLE MARATHON—(Associated Press Sports Writer) HAGDAU, Cal., Mar. 10 (AP)—Another episode of sun-baked desert country stretched before the caravan of 140-odd transcontinental trekkers, survivors of a band which started last Sunday on a 3400-mile marathon trail.

Into Hagdad, on the Mojave desert, they trudged last night after a 41.9-mile battle with burning sun and choking dust. To another waterhole, 41.5 miles deeper into the desolate region, they turned their faces today in the seventh lap of the quest for \$48,500 in gold. Essek, an oasis somewhat smaller than that at which they spent the night was their day objective. As the marathons broke camp and again turned eastward into the heart-breaking grind, Arthur Newton, 44-year-old "Rhodesia" road runner, ranked as the leader of the cavalcade. He was leader by virtue of the lowest total elapsed time for the 207.5 miles covered since the continental trek started from Los Angeles. His tireless, mile-cutting gait brought him victory in the last two laps. Yesterday he strode over the 41.9-mile tortuous desert trail to end up with a total time of 31 hours and two minutes.

Plan Second—Close behind the veteran British campaigner in elapsed time was a slight but fleet Finnish racer, Otto Wintgen. The 26-year-old Finn did not do so well in yesterday's stretch but his consistent time in previous laps gave him second place in the total time. His was 32 hours 15 minutes and seven seconds.

A lithe negro youth from Seattle, Ed Gardner, winner of an earlier lap and one of the favored in the race for fame and fortune, finished close behind Newton in yesterday's leg of the jaunt. His time for the run from Mojave Wells gave him third position in elapsed time, with 34 hours, one minute and 36 seconds.

Nicholas Quamawahu, Indian running star from the Hopi tribe of Arizona, was far behind the leaders in this but his trainers were optimistic that he would make up distance as a sprained ankle was beginning to answer to treatment.

He was forced to walk yesterday and his time today was 52 hours, 53 minutes and 50 seconds for the distance covered.

Allen D. Currier, Grants, Pa., Ore., finished fifty-fifth in yesterday's lap. Time for lap 10:46:40 making elapsed time 44:07:05.

Boy Scout Troops Show Big Increase—Several of the boy scout troops of the Eastern Oregon council have re-registered for this year, and others are re-registering, practically all of them showing an increase in membership over last year.

Troop No. 9, of Halfway, re-registered today with 19 more scouts than last year, making a total membership of 18. The Christian church troop here, No. 15, is also re-registering today with 19 scouts, as compared with eight when the troop was registered last year, and troop No. 11, of the Lutheran church, will re-register the first of the week with 16 boys. The Rev. L. H. Aves is scoutmaster of the Lutheran church troop and Leslie White is scoutmaster of troop No. 15. It is necessary for each scout troop to register at the beginning of every year.

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Miners Caught In Cave-In At Texiulan, Mex.

MEXICO CITY, Mar. 10 (AP)—A dispatch to Excelsior today said that 30 miners were entombed in one of the tunnels of the Aurora mine, near Texiulan, state of Puebla.

Fire broke out inside of the mine and part of the walls caved in when burning timbers gave way. Sixty miners were rescued. Thirty others were believed to be inside and little hope was held for their safety.

Two members of the rescuing crew were suffocated by fumes when they attempted to enter the shaft.

Woman on Flight To Capetown, Africa

LE BOURGET, France, Mar. 10 (AP)—Lady Mary Bailey who is now on a solo flight to Capetown, 6000 miles distant arrived at Le Bourget today and will continue here flight tomorrow.

She was forced to descend last night on account of fog at Sacy Le Petit in the department of Oise, north of Paris.

Lady Bailey, who is the wife of a millionaire, has won a trophy for being the outstanding woman aviator of 1927.

"I am traveling light," she said. "I am taking only two suitcases, but I mean to make a comfortable trip. This is my summer holiday."

TWO HELD AS VAGRANTS—PORTLAND, Ore., Mar. 10 (AP)—Floyd C. Benson, 27, and Leroy Andrews, 20, were held today on vagrancy charges while police were investigating reports that the two were involved in a scheme to defraud through announcement of plans to establish a motor car agency here.

J. P. Tarola, manager of the Portland Hippomobile automobile agency, indicated today he would file a complaint. The young men, police said, falsified telegrams and gave out false reports that the Tarola agency was to be discontinued.

PREVENT STRIKE RIOT—ST. CLAIRSVILLE, O., Mar. 10 (AP)—Timely arrival of Colonel Don Caldwell and a contingent of deputy U. S. marshals and national guardsmen at the Florence mine near Martin's Ferry, today probably averted serious trouble between union miners and sympathizers and non-union employees of the mine. Advised by officials of the V and O coal company which operates the mine that a "large mob" was attacking the non-union workers as they came to the mine, Colonel Caldwell hastily assembled 21 guardsmen and deputy United States marshals and hastened to the scene.

PRINCE FALLS AGAIN—MELTON MOWBRAY, England, Mar. 10 (AP)—The Prince of Wales had a fall while exercising his horses at Croxton Park today but was not injured.

NO MORE "COUNTRY STORE" NIGHTS IN PORTLAND—PORTLAND, Ore., Mar. 10 (AP)—"Country store" nights at Portland theaters must be discontinued after March 11 according to an edict issued today by chief of police Leon V. Jenkins.

"Country store" nights, Chief Jenkins said may be classified under state law as lotteries.

BODY DISCOVERED—NEWPORT NEWS, Va., Mar. 10 (AP)—The Times-Herald today says the body of a naval officer clad in uniform and believed to be that of one of the three fliers lost Feb. 27 when they disappeared in an amphibian plane bound for Annapolis was brought to the surface but not recovered by dredgers near Cherry Stone Light.

APPOINT TRUSTEE—PORTLAND, Ore., Mar. 10 (AP)—J. G. Gillingham was selected today as trustee in bankruptcy of the defunct brokerage firm of Overbeck and Cooke. Creditors of the firm made the selection of Gillingham, who has been temporary receiver.

BOARD ENDS MEETS—ROSEBURG, Mar. 10 (AP)—The meeting of the Pacific Northwest Advisory board ended here yesterday evening after a successful and interesting conference. The visiting shippers and growers from various parts of Oregon and Washington numbered nearly 200, Southern Oregon being particularly well represented.

Blonde Accused Of Attempts To Fix Vice Jurors

PORTLAND, Ore., Mar. 10 (AP)—Traced by the license number of her automobile, a woman said to be a mysterious blonde accused of attempting to fix jurors in a forthcoming vice trial was interviewed today by Deputy Sheriff Christ-offerson and Chief Deputy District Attorney George Mowry.

The officers went to the woman's home to question her. Officers withheld the suspected woman's name until after the questioning.

Stanley Myers, district attorney late yesterday requested Sheriff Hurlburt to investigate the woman's activities, and after an investigation Deputy Sheriff Christ-offerson today reported that developments disclosed attempts had been made to reach Jurymen.

The plot was revealed when a juror reported to Presiding Judge Ekwall that she had been questioned by a woman who appeared to be looking for real estate. She declared that she was suspicious of the woman's motive in questioning her. Other jurors then disclosed that they had been visited at their homes by the same woman.

The famed blizzard of '88 was to be repeated. On March 11 and 12, that year, the east was blanketed with the worst snow storm of record, 26.9 inches being reported in New York City where traffic was disrupted for days, and the city cut off from outside communication. Property loss at that time was estimated at \$25,000,000.

The heaviest snow fall today was in the Pennsylvania mountains which unofficial estimates placed at 10 inches, and at Clarksburg in upstate New York where there was a foot.

Trains Late—Trains were running from a few minutes to hours behind schedule and many highways were blocked. Several bus lines in New York, Pennsylvania and New England were forced to discontinue service because of drifts.

The Great Lakes were shipped into huge waves, in some sections going over embankments onto highways and into cellars of Lakeside homes.

New York City had a four-inch snow fall. Six to eight thousand extra workers were added to the street cleaning force of 8000. In Manhattan the steam lines under the pavements and the higher temperature turned the snow into water and slush but in outlying sections there were drifts.

Bears Escape—The storm brought liberty to several denizens of the zoo at Santa Fe. Marie when the drifts piled so high they were enabled to walk over the tops of fences. Several bears and wolves escaped in that way.

Forecasts over most of the east today were for clearing skies and cold.

Early this afternoon, however, with weather conditions still bad.
