## FLOODS MENACE ENTOMBED MINERS

**Wall of Fire Prevents Rescue of 11 in Tunnels Near Tezuitlan, Mex.**

MEXICO CITY, Mar. 12 (AP)—A dispatch to El Universal from Tezuitlan today said that water was rising and flooding Aurora mine, near here, where eleven men are entombed. Rescuers were reported to be spreading through the upper levels.

Eight bodies were recovered by rescue squads last night. The toll today stood at 25 dead and 45 injured. The majority of the injured were suffering from gas poisoning and poisonous gases were reported to be spreading through the upper levels.

The American foreman named Morris was taken ill after directing the rescue work for 72 hours during which time he saved several miners. Doctors feared that he might become insane because of a nervous breakdown.

C. A. Lantz, chief of the relief expedition from Cachucho, believed that the entombed men died either through asphyxiation, drowning or starvation. He said water was slowly flooding the mine.

Daniel Moreno, one of the rescue crew, became crazed when lowered inside the pit to attend the pumps.

tion from Harry F. Sinclair, lessee of Teapot Dome to the republican committee.

"Mr. Hays secretly received \$5,000 in Liberty bonds from the chief beneficiary in the fraudulent transactions by which the naval oil reserves were bartered away," he said, "and proceeded by methods common to crooks with efforts to exchange the bonds with prominent Republicans for cash."

**Charges Corruption.**—"Such records as were kept warrant the conviction that the whole transaction was corrupt. The testimony of Mr. Hays before the committee in 1924, warrants the conclusion that he deliberately concealed the use by him, as political chairman, of the bonds obtained from Mr. Sinclair, and in that sense subjected himself to the possible charge of perjury."

"Quite lately before the committee when at last the slimy transaction was divulged, Mr. Hays said: 'I did not volunteer about the government bonds. I was not asked about that.'"

"Every witness when sworn declares that he will tell the truth, the whole truth and nothing but the truth." True, nobody asked him direct questions as to whether Liberty bonds were received from Mr. Sinclair in 1924 to help pay the deficit but in that year when testifying it appears that he was asked whether Mr. Sinclair had contributed more than \$75,000 to the republican committee deficit of 1920 and he answered 'no'. His testimony now disclosed \$55,000 in government bonds in addition to the \$75,000 as a contribution, making a total of \$130,000.

"Recent testimony before the senate committee," the Arkansas senator declared, "discloses peculiarly disgusting corruption."

He declared that the committee sometime ago had "revealed an infamous betrayal of trust by two cabinet officers—Secretary Fall and Attorney General Daugherty"—and spoke of the "assinine stupidity" of the secretary of the navy, Mr. Denby.

**Mellon on Stand Next.**—Mr. Mellon will be the first witness at the re-opening of the hearings and probably will be followed by William M. Butler, chairman of the republican national committee who has advised Senator Walsh that he received no liberty bonds

or other contributions to the republican national committee from Hays or Harry F. Sinclair. Hays also has been summoned for a third time and will be asked to explain why he withheld from the committee on his previous appearance the information that he had sent \$50,000 of the Sinclair bonds to Secretary Mellon.

**War Vet's Memory Back; Asks Pension**

WALLA WALLA, Wash., Mar. 12 (AP)—If Charles Blewitt of Pendleton, Ore., is the Charles Blewitt Indian war veteran, that he thinks he is, Herbert E. Johnson, assistant cashier in a bank here, may be able to help him get his pension, Johnson said.

Blewitt, in a letter published here and in Spokane, said that in 1877 he was wounded by Indians and forced to flee his identity. He remembered being in August, when he was injured again.

Blewitt now seeks information from members of the first, second, third and fourth regiments of United States cavalry, that he may identify himself.

Johnson, who came here in the states, said he recalled a Charles Blewitt, who lived across the street from him, who went with volunteers to fight Indians and was supposedly killed.

Johnson says he remembers the funeral procession going by as the body lay in state at that of Blewitt was buried here with military honors.

**Portland Slide Checks Traffic**

causes of slides resulting from heavy rains and "chubooks" which melted the snow in the mountains. The Snake river had risen 10 1/2 feet above low water, which was a rise of two feet in ten hours.

Several bridges between here and Idles have been made unsafe and the line has been closed until repairs are made.

REDDING, Cal., Mar. 12 (AP)—Shasta, Trinity and Shastyou counties received another drenching rain tonight. It was reported falling throughout all of north California with very little snow even in the higher elevations.

**WINTER IN EUROPE.**—LONDON, Mar. 12 (AP)—Storms and cold gripped much of Europe today. Their advent snuffed out the lives of two fliers and defeated an English girl in her third attempt to swim the Strait of Gibraltar. Iceland enjoyed comparatively mild weather.

A French Paris-to-London air liner found the storm too severe to face and landed its passengers near Calais. Yesterday despite the uncertain weather Pilot Schmitz and Mechanic Andre Perrade attempted to continue the flight. The storm was too strong and the plane plunged into the sea, drowning them.

Miss Mercedes Gletsz, a London typist, was taken from the box after having swum for seven hours and 40 minutes in the Strait of Gibraltar. Starting from Tarifa, Spain, she had made good progress on her third attempt to cross the strait until she was little more than a mile off Cape Hill on the African coast when the sea grew rough and the tide changed.

Bilzards in the British Isles cut down attendance at soccer matches.

Cold and frost hindered balloting in the Polish senatorial elections.

Germany was swept by icy northern blasts which were accompanied in places by heavy snow fall. Similar conditions prevailed in France.

Farmers in England were hard pushed to protect their lambs endangered by the sudden change.

The first slide was estimated at 50,000 cubic yards of earth. It was believed to have been caused by recent heavy rains which weakened loose earth on the mountain sides. New peril was seen in a heavy rain which fell yesterday afternoon.

**JONATHAN HAAS.**—ENTERPRISE, Ore., Mar. 12 (Special)—Jonathan Haas, pioneer stockman and farmer of this city, who died Friday evening after a protracted illness will be buried in the Enterprise cemetery Wednesday.

Mr. Haas was a veteran of the civil war and was 82 years of age at the time of his death. His wife and one daughter, Mrs. F. A. Moody, of this city, and a grandson, Jay Langston survive. Mr. Haas was a good business manager and during his many years residence in Walla Walla county amassed a considerable fortune. Of late years he had not been able to do much physical work but managed to keep his affairs well in hand and in one of the few who came through the past few years of business depression with his business in good shape.

## BRAZILIAN SLIDE BURIES SCORES

**Thirty-Nine Bodies Removed—Many May Never Be Recovered**

SANTOS, Brazil, Mar. 12 (AP)—Clapping cracks in the side of Mount Serrat towering in the center of this stricken city, today threatened new disaster as the 1500 volunteers dug steadily into the ruins of Saturday's slide.

The known dead stood at 29 and it was feared that the ponderous mass of earth crashing down upon the sleeping city had crushed out 200 lives.

Women, weeping and waiting, and terror-stricken children stood around the scene, remnants of families shattered by catastrophe. They hoped that out of the mass of earth, crumbled walls and rock, the rescuers would dig forth friends or relatives still alive.

From the debris was taken a woman who had been buried for 25 hours in a room with the body of her husband. Others injured were brought forth, crushed. The authorities held little hope that many would be taken out alive. They said that the mass of earth was so great that even many of the bodies interred would probably never be recovered.

**Prevent Second Tragedy.**—Police ordered a wide area around the slide evacuated and this prevented a fresh disaster when a new avalanche occurred yesterday on the opposite side from the first slide. Nine bodies were crushed but there were no casualties.

The enormous quantity of earth was shifted hampered the work of excavators, who included all classes of people laboring side by side.
