## THE GARDEN

**USES FOR A COLD FRAME**  
Cold frames serve such a great variety of garden uses that they are now a common adjunct to a garden. Almost everything in the garden can be raised in them and some people even raise young chickens in them. The cold frame serves both as a starting plant for early plants as well as a storage plant and a winter garden.

The most frequent use, however, is for early seed sowing. Lettuce, cabbage and cauliflower can be started for early transplanting. A row of radishes may be planted to be pulled direct from the frame. Tomatoes will bloom off and on all winter in a cold frame, and parsley may be cut as needed from it. Gladiolus may be started in a cold frame and left to bloom there for the earliest crop of stems to cut for the house. They can get month's advance on outdoor planting under the friendly protection of the glass.

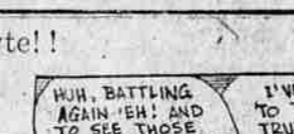
A cold frame is a safe and convenient storage for chrysanthemums after they have bloomed. The stems that sprout from the main stem in the fall, even in the hardest varieties, are often injured by winter weather. They come through in a cold frame unscathed. The handsome pansies, which do not bloom the first year from seed except from a very early start, may be started and wintered in a frame. Wallflowers may be grown in the same way.

The handsome poppy anemones, with their gay blooms which have become so popular as florists' cutting material, may be grown in the home cold frame, starting plants from seed this spring. They will start blooming next year in March. Dahlias may be sprouted in pots starting in early April to be set out in permanent quarters when May sunshine makes the temperature suitable. Start a cold frame this year. You will never be without one either for vegetables or flowers.

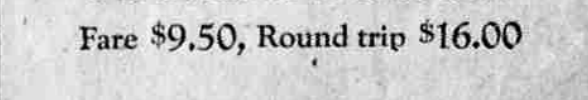
