Some irrigated sections have a surplus of hay.

Cattle—Cattle on the ranges and ranches have come through the winter generally in good condition, with only the usual seasonal shrink in flesh. Losses have been lighter than usual and cattle of all classes are in strong, healthy condition. Breeding cows are in good shape and prospects for the 1928 calf crop are good. Cattle on feed for market made good gains and a considerable number have gone to market. A strong demand developed in the southwest for cattle at very good prices. High prices have had a tendency to restrict stocking and the buying of cattle for spring delivery in some sections. The condition of cattle is placed at 85 per cent of normal compared with 85 per cent last month and 85 per cent a year ago and the five-year average of 82.2 per cent.

Sheep—February weather was generally favorable to range sheep, which have wintered very well. Ranges were generally open with some feeding where deer range was short. Range sheep are in very good condition and winter losses have been very light.

The size of the early lamb crop in the principal early lambing states as a whole is estimated at about 8 per cent larger than last year. The condition of the crop about Mar. 1 was about average, but not as good as on Mar. 1, 1927. Weather and feed conditions since Jan. 1 have been quite varied in the different states, but on the whole were not as favorable as during the first two months of 1927. The movement to market in volume will start somewhat later than last year. The total supply of spring lambs at eastern and middle western markets before July 1 will probably exceed last year, and may considerably exceed it if conditions in California improve during March.

In The Northwest—In Idaho, Washington and Oregon, weather conditions in the early lambing sections during February were unusually good. Ewes were in very good condition at lambing time and the percentage of lambs saved was above average. There is an ample supply of soil moisture to insure good range feed with warmer weather. Some increase in the number of early lambs over last year is indicated and with favorable weather the shipments of lambs from these states in June will be considerably larger than last year.

In Oregon condition of ranges on Mar. 1 was 92, compared with a five-year average of 85.4. Cattle conditions were listed at 95, higher than the five-year average of 93.4, and sheep were at 98, with the five-year average 95.6.
