Klamath Doctor Is Given Verdict

KLAMATH FALLS, Mar. 14. (AP)—A verdict in favor of Dr. Warren Hunt, owner of the Klamath Valley hospital and defendant in a \$16,450 damage suit brought by Mrs. Marie Philipson was rendered last night by a jury after deliberation of about an hour.

Mrs. Philipson had contended that burns incurred from a hot water bottle following an operation in the hospital were caused by the negligence of one of the hospital nurses and that Dr. Hunt, as the owner of the hospital and the employer of the nurse, was responsible for the injury.
