BULLISH TREND
MAINTAINS PACESpecialties Marked Up \$5
to \$14 a Share—Sales
More Than 3,000,000

NEW YORK, Mar. 14 (AP)—The rapid advance of prices was checked in the last few minutes of trading in the stock market today after many stocks had advanced \$2 to \$17 a share. The close revealed net losses in a number of important issues such as General Electric and U. S. Steel, but Radio closed \$3 a share higher at \$150, and American Linseed was up \$12.75 at \$197.

NEW YORK, Mar. 14 (AP)—Traders who already had lost millions of dollars through the spectacular advances in Radio and General Motors, received further punishment on the stock exchange today when powerful "bull" pools marked up a number of specialties \$5 to \$14 a share.

An opening break of \$5 a share in Radio caused a flurry of selling in a number of stocks which dipped \$1 to nearly \$3 a share in the first few minutes of trading. But the market soon headed upward again with "shorts" in full retreat. Radio rallied from \$135 to \$152.50 before the end of the third hour. General Motors, after absorbing an enormous volume of profit-taking in the last three days, started forward again and climbed to within \$2 a share of the record of \$161 established last Saturday.

The speculative spotlight had switched, at least temporarily, to other stocks believed to harbor a large short interest. American Linseed, which had soared \$10.75 a share yesterday was whirled upward another \$17.50 today, touching a new high at \$111.75 as against a low of \$56.27 on Jan. 12. Mullins Body jumped \$11 a share and Vanadium Steel \$5. Hudson Motors touched a new 128 high record at \$38 a share. Total sales approximated 3,200,000 shares.
