MEDFORD, DALLES WIN FIRST GAMES

Milton-Freewater Quintet Defeated in Drab Hoop Contest, 28 to 17

SALEM, Ore., Mar. 15 (AP)—Medford and The Dalles high schools went into the lead of the state high school basketball championship fight by winning the first two games played. The Pear Pickers defeated Tillamook, 35 to 24, and The Dalles won from McLoughlin high of Milton-Freewater.

The Cheese Makers gave Medford plenty of trouble in the first half, holding the lead at half time 14 to 11. They could not stand Medford's fighting race in the second half, their defense crumbled and the team from Southern Oregon piled up the points. Al Melvin was the shining light in Medford's lineup. THYE IS GIVEN VICTORY OVER C. KAUFFMAN

PORTLAND, Ore., Mar. 15 (AP)—One of the shortest and most spectacular wrestling matches ever witnessed here, was awarded Ted Thye, over Cletis Kauffman here last night. It required eight minutes and 40 seconds of actual wrestling. Thirty-seven seconds after the men shook hands, Kauffman had Thye pounding the floor, conceding the fall when Kauffman grabbed his legs and had Thye in a wicked crab hold. Second fall went to Thye in three minutes. The final fall came after four minutes, 28 seconds during which Rudy Warner, who was refereeing, took a wild swing from Kauffman on the chin and while he was out, Kauffman crashed Thye to the mat with a flying headlock. Kauffman started looking for the referee which gave Thye his chance to get out from under and turn the tables, rolling Kauffman on his back. Warner, over Kauffman's bitter protest, awarded the fall to Thye.

Horemans Wins Billiard Title From Schaefer

SAN FRANCISCO, Mar. 15 (AP)—The world's 18.2 ball cue billiard championship may be carried to Europe permanently by Eduard Horemans. The Belgian artist wrested the title from Jake Schaefer here last night by scoring 1500 points to 1150 in 54 innings. Billiard circles have heard that it was Horemans' intention to keep the title permanently, even going as far as retiring if necessary. Some critics, however, disagreed with this view, and said they believed Horemans would consent to give Willie Hoppe, former title holder, a challenge match.

British Marvel Maintains Lead In Bunion Derby

Newland (Associated Press Sports Writer) PEACH SPRINGS, Haulapai Indian Reservation, Ariz., Mar. 15 (AP)—When the more than 100 foot races yet in the Los Angeles to New York marathon lined up today on the twelfth lap of the 2400-mile course, Arthur Newton, 44-year-old British endurance marvel topped the list by the comfortable margin of nearly eight hours in elapsed time. For the 297.4 miles covered since the start Mar. 4, the sinewy entrant from Rhodesia, South Africa, had a total time of 61:23:00. He came in first yesterday on the 51.7-mile lap between Kingman and Peach Springs to add 1:03:30 to his lead over Andrew Payne, Claremore, Okla., second in elapsed time standing. Payne checked in fourth Wednesday and his total time today read 69:07:02. Newton's tireless running, under circumstances that so far have run the gamut in weather conditions, has brought him six first places in the eleven laps now put behind. The route today led to Seligman, 28 miles eastward, and bringing the racers into higher country.
