MARCH IS GOOD MONTH FOR FERTILIZING LAWN

A beautiful green lawn sets off a home as nothing else will, but in order to have a good lawn it is sometimes necessary to add fertilizer to the soil to insure a better grass growth, says Dr. H. E. Stephenson, associate professor of soils at the Oregon State college.

"March is the ideal time to fertilize the lawn," said Dr. Stephenson, "and ammonium sulphate is the best fertilizer to use, because it produces an acid condition in the soil, which is favorable to the growth of lawn grasses but retards the growth of weeds."

"Much experimental work has been done with different nitrogen carrying lawn fertilizers. The application of ammonium sulphate

at the rate of about half a pound to 100 square feet of soil has given best results. After the material has been dusted on the lawn, it is advisable to wash the blades of grass free from chemical to prevent burning," he concluded.

Bridge Pointers

CONTRACT BRIDGE

Last week these articles were about the strength required, when playing Contract, for a jump by the partner of a player who has bid No Trump. This week our much more difficult subject will be the strength required (the score being love) for a jump by the partner of a player who has made an initial suit bid.

In the case of jumping a No Trump bid, it is generally a question of high cards and the count of Ace 4, King 3, Queen 2 and Jack 1 works satisfactorily in determining whether to jump; but only in the exceptional hand is this count of value in determining whether to jump a suit bid.

To clarify the subject, it may be pointed out that a Queen or Jack, even when singly guarded or a singleton, is apt to be of material value in determining whether to fulfill a No Trump contract; but Jacks and Queens of any suit other than the trump, unless associated with higher honors in the same suit, cannot be depended upon to prove of material value in assisting a partner's suit bid. The assets which are most apt to be of value are:

1. Length in the suit named by partner.

2. The Ace, King or Queen of the suit named by partner.

3. The Ace-King, Ace-Queen or King-Queen of another suit.

4. Aces or Kings, especially Aces, of other suits.

5. Void suits, or singletons with enough trumps in the hand to make successful ruffing probable.

Other complications in considering the questions of suit jumps are the great difference between Major and Minor suits; and the fact that the partner (at a love score) may start by bidding one, two or three, thereby showing three different standards of holding, all of which must be differentiated by the jumper in determining what to do. Furthermore, when the partner starts by bidding one, there is a question of whether the jump should be to two or to three.

In order to cover this complicated question as fully as possible, the various possibilities will be discussed in order. We will start by considering what strength the partner of a Major-suit bidder of one needs to jump that bid to two, three or four, as the case may be.

In this discussion only cases in which the score of the jumper is love (zero) will be considered. If the jumper had a score he would not, in any case, jump to more than game unless desiring to bid for a slam. Slam situations will be considered under the heading of Slam Bidding. When the partner's bid, if made, would go game, no jump would be made except for slam purposes.

Darker Hosiery, Simpler Shoes In Favor

(Associated Press Fashion Editor) PARIS (AP)—Darker hosiery and simpler shoes are in the mode again.

In a season when gowns are simple, accessories, including shoes, are elaborate. Now that more elaborate dresses and wraps are having their turn, footwear designs are less complex.

The spring shoe, especially for street or daytime wear, are more often of one tone than of two or three. Black is the chosen color for street wear, particularly after noon. Brown is standard for before noon. Black satin is favored for wear from four o'clock to midnight. Those are the three broad working rules in which Paris builds its shoe fashions. There are dozens of exceptions.

The rule for stockings is simpler. The tendency is toward darker hose for day wear, deep sunburn and grays predominating. For evening the new shade is a few tones darker than the complexion. Summer is expected to bring a vogue of very dark sunburn hosiery.

BREAKFAST—Stewed prunes, cereal, cream, creamed dried beef with croutons, popovers, milk, coffee.

LUNCHEON—Scalloped bread and cheese, stewed tomatoes, brown bread, floating island, crisp cookies, milk, tea.

DINNER—Stuffed pork tenderloin, scalloped sweet potatoes and pineapple, French fried onions, endive with Roquefort cheese dressing, orange sherbet, plain cake, milk, coffee.

A most attractive way to serve an orange sherbet is in an orange shell. A garnish of whipped cream is good and adds some fat calories to a concoction definitely poor in fat.

French Fried Onions

Three or four large onions, milk, 1 cup flour, 4 teaspoon salt, 2-3 cup water, 2 tablespoons melted butter, 1 egg white.

Peel and cut onions in slices about 1/4 inch thick. Use the large outer rings saving the small centers for some other use. Cover rings with milk and let stand one hour. Drain and dry between towels. Mix and sift flour and salt and add water. Beat until perfectly smooth. Beat in melted butter and fold in stiffly beaten white of egg. Dip each ring in the batter and drop into hot fat. Fry about two minutes and drain on soft crumpled paper.

Instead of soaking onions in milk and dipping in the batter they can be dipped in milk and then in flour lightly seasoned with salt and pepper. Fry in deep hot fat about two minutes and drain.
