Final Arguments Made In Trial Of Prohi Agent

PORTLAND, Ore., Mar. 15 (AP)—Closing arguments were made today in the trial of Terry A. Talent, federal prohibition officer, on charges of involuntary manslaughter resulting from the death of Martin Zimmerman, rancher of Trail, Ore. The case was expected to go to the jury late today.

United States District Attorney Neuner, defending Talent, argued that the officer was engaged in performance of duty when he fired at Zimmerman as the latter ran from officers who were raiding his ranch last September. Neuner contended that the raid was part of an effort to suppress a liquor ring that operated in the vicinity of the Zimmerman farm.

L. A. Liljeqvist, assistant state attorney general, prosecutor, countered the defense argument that the shooting occurred in apprehension of a man engaged in a felony by contending that the sale of liquor is not in fact a felony, and has not been so termed by the supreme court. He argued that under any circumstances the officer had no right to shoot Zimmerman.

George Newman, of Medford, informant for prohibition officers who raided the ranch, testified late yesterday for the defense. He said he had been buying liquor at the Zimmerman ranch for several months, several gallons at a time, he decided after quarreling with the sellers over quality of the liquor to "turn them in." Newman was along on the night of Sept. 28 when Talent attempted to arrest Zimmerman.

was faultily built and whether Los Angeles city officials had any reason prior to the disaster to fear that it might give way. The latter phase of the probe sprang from statements of ranchers living below the dam that it had been leaking or keeping for some time before the final break.

Authorities of Ventura county, whose residents in the Santa Clara river valley fought construction of the dam, today started the manhunt of the committee, named yesterday to probe the tragedy to the bottom.

The first inquests on bodies of other victims were opened today in Ventura county, two in the morning at Moorpark and Fillmore, and two in the afternoon at Santa Paula and Oxnard.

Former Kaiser's Sister To Lose Young Husband

BERLIN, Mar. 15 (AP)—Alexandra Subkoff, young husband of Princess Victoria of Schaumburg-Lippe, sister of the former Kaiser, has been ordered expelled from Germany by the police authorities of Cologne.

It was stated that the expulsion order was issued because the young Russian refugee, one time dishwasher and dancer, has not renewed his residence permit in time.

The expulsion order described Subkoff as a man without a nationality or occupation.

Reports were current today that he has already left for the Congo. Princess Victoria, although forgoing her German citizenship when she was married to Subkoff, was not included in the expulsion order and she is remaining at Bonn.

Mandell to Defend His Title May 17

NEW YORK, Mar. 15 (AP)—Sammy Mandell's world's lightweight champion, and his foremost challenger, Baby Face Jimmy McLarnin signed articles with Tex Rickard today, through their managers, for a 15-round match at the Polo grounds May 17.

CHICAGO, Mar. 15 (AP)—Backed by the Illinois boxing commission, Promoter Jim Mullen of Chicago today said he was ready to employ every means known to the legal profession to prevent the lightweight championship match between Sammy Mandell and Jimmy McLarnin at Madison Square Garden New York, May 17.

Mullen has the signature of Mandell and his manager, Eddie Kane, to a contract, calling for a titular match in Chicago, June 21, between the champion and an unnamed opponent. Yesterday, Kane signed for the McLarnin bout under the promotion of Tex Rickard.

Lambs Are Shorn In Easter Rite

ROME (AP)—Two little white lambs, from whose wool will be woven the palliums sent by the Pope to newly created archbishops, are now being shorn in the garden of the St. Cecilia monastery. There they will be kept until Easter, when they will be shorn.

TWO lambs are selected every year on St. Agnes' day, raised on meadows adjacent to the church named for that early Christian martyr, they are trusted up in baskets, placed on the high altar and blessed with a special rite. Afterward they are taken to the vatikan where the Pope blesses them.

NEW YORK (AP)—Frances Alda, opera star, wife of Giulio Gatti-Casazza, metropolitan impresario, is to adopt a boy and girl in order to make life worth while. At 44 she finds wealth, beauty and talent insufficient. "All my home needs is children," she says. "I haven't any of my own. So I want to be a mother by proxy."

There was still hope that the Honorable Elsie Mackay and Captain Hinchliffe, British war ace, had somehow escaped the fate met last summer by the Princess Lowenstein-Wertheim and her two pilots, and by Nungesser and Coli but it was the hope of desperation.

Miss Mackay and Hinchliffe took off in England at 3:40 o'clock Eastern Standard time Tuesday morning and by the most optimistic computation their gasoline would only have kept them afloat until dawn today. But hours after that no definite word had been received of them and aviators generally feared that the North Atlantic, never yet crossed by an airplane in the westerly direction had increased the number of its victims by two.
