REED MAY ENTER OREGON PRIMARY

Filing Blanks Are Sent to Washington at Request of Oswald West

SALEM, Ore., Mar. 16. (AP)—At the request of Oswald West, national democratic committeeman for Oregon, presidential primary filing blanks were today forwarded from the office of the secretary of state to Senator James A. Reed at Washington.

This is interpreted as a certain indication that Reed's name will be before the democratic voters of Oregon in the primary election in May.

One filing form was sent Reed by special delivery and another by air mail.

Investigation Pending

The driver of one disregarded or failed to see the traffic signals of George McIntyre, 17-year-old Cascade boy, who waved at it to stop. McIntyre was the only survivor of his family.

Preparations are being completed at Santa Paula for a public funeral for the residents of the Santa Clara river valley who died in the disaster.

At the request of the Santa Paula rehabilitation committee, made of the Los Angeles chamber of commerce yesterday, a stream of tractors, steam shovels, horses and wagons poured into the devastated Santa Clara river valley to aid in the reconstruction work.

In other parts of Ventura county, Fillmore, Mrs. Moorpark, Oxford and Ventura, funeral preparations also are under way, while search for further victims went forward.

Investigation Go On

In Los Angeles county, on whose land the St. Francis dam stood, in San Francisco canyon, Saugus and Newhall are the centers of rehabilitation and search.

The sheriff's office at Saugus reported the belief that the bodies of all victims in that sector had been recovered.

Over the site of the ruined dam parties of investigating engineers are clamoring, seeking data to fix responsibility for the catastrophe.

State experts, engineers from the city and county of Los Angeles and others from Ventura county are engaged in these surveys. A federal commission will arrive later.

rice for the shops superintendent, which will be 12 by 25 feet, a stock room along one side 20 by 35 feet, a machine shop 20 by 48 feet, a carpenter shop 20 by 48 feet and the main shop 56 by 124 feet. There will be a traveling crane over the center bay of the shop for lifting heavy pieces of machinery and other equipment for convenience in repairing equipment. The shops floor will be entirely of concrete.

The storage shed will be 48 by 120 feet and will be open along one entire side, this side to face the railroad tracks. The purpose of this building is to keep equipment under cover and it will be used for this alone. The floor will be of gravel.

About 50 feet back from the main shop building the material and storage building will stand and just west of it will be the service building.

Brick Service Building

The service building will be of brick construction and will be 34 by 75 feet and will contain a greasing and oiling room, a wash rack, locker room and a boiler and fuel room, which will house the central heating plant for all of the buildings on the grounds. The locker room will contain steel lockers for the workmen, wash basins and a shower.

The material and storage building will be 34 by 144 feet, with a six-foot loading platform at one end. The floor in a section of the building 48 by 34, where the heavy materials such as parts and construction materials will be kept, will be even with the platform, making loading and unloading easy. Another section of the building, 24 by 24 feet will be used as a storage place for the bridge department for construction materials and equipment and the remainder of the building 34 by 72 feet will be used as a warm storage space, to provide a place for the storage of equipment during the winter, such as snow saws, trucks and to have them warm and ready for service at a minute's call.

All of the buildings will be electrically lighted, the lighting not being included in the contract except in the case of the office building. Neither is the steam heating plant included in the construction contract.

Start Work Next Month

The construction work which will start sometime after the first of next month will be under the supervision of Mervyn Stephenson, state highway bridge engineer in charge of this division.

The grounds with the exception of the stretch fronting on Adams avenue will be graded. A section 140 by 150 feet will be fenced off for the use of the maintenance patrolmen, where equipment for local maintenance work will be kept.

ing great strides toward the pacific adjustments of international disputes."

Shun Military Advances

Explaining that in the present treaty negotiations it was the purpose of the United States in so far as possible to eliminate war as a factor in international relations, Mr. Kellogg said the United States cannot obligate itself in advance to use its armed forces against any other nation of the world. The United States does not believe that the peace of the world or of Europe, depends upon or can be assured by treaties of military alliance, the fulfillment of which as guarantors of peace is repeatedly demonstrated in the pages of history, he said.

The arbitration treaty with France, recently ratified by the senate, as well as other treaties, were discussed at length by Mr. Kellogg who said it was difficult for him to see by what claim a government could properly request arbitration of disputes covered by the four exceptions stipulated in the treaty, including the Monroe Doctrine, since few, if any, would present questions justiciable in their nature.

THREE BRITISH NAVAL HEADS ARE DISMISSED

LONDON, Mar. 16. (AP)—Three British naval officers including a rear admiral, have been suspended from duty as an outgrowth of a mysterious incident aboard the battleship Royal Oak, flagship of the Mediterranean fleet.

Some of the newspapers have even characterized the incident as a "naval mutiny" but no authoritative information is available.

Today an admiralty communique was issued saying that the three officers concerned in the Malta naval incident had been suspended. They were Rear Admiral Bernard St. G. Collard, in command of the battleship squadron; Captain Kenneth Dewar, in command of the Royal Oak; and Commander H. M. Daniel.

The communique issued this afternoon threw no light on the nature of the incident in the Mediterranean beyond saying that it involved certain "disciplinary" matters and added that Rear Admiral Collard's flag has not been transferred to another ship as had been reported, but was "struck."

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
