POULTRY PRICES SHOW FIRMNESS

Standard First-Grade Eggs Higher and Butter Quotations Are Firmer

PORTLAND, Ore., Mar. 16 (AP)—Poultry prices were firm today, with capons very scarce and higher at 35¢. Roosters were in good demand with offerings small, and brought 29¢-32¢ alive, 30¢-35¢ dressed. Practically no broilers were offered but quotations were around 35¢ per pound. Live weight for birds over one pound. Other classes of fowls were steady to firm with practically everything sold on receipt.

Butter prices were firmer today, although the only change in dairy exchange quotations was 1/2¢ in the price of firsts to 43¢. Butterfat f.o.b. Portland was quoted a cent higher at 52¢.

Standard first grade eggs were 1/2¢ higher today, but other grades were steady at yesterday's prices. Receipts yesterday were reported at 2936 cases, of which 659 cases went into storage.

On the country dressed meat market things were about as usual today. Veal was a trifle easier at 17¢-20¢; but trading was brisk and available offerings cleaned up readily. Beef was drab but other classes moved well and prices were unchanged.

Cauliflower is cheaper, due to heavy receipts from Oregon growing sections. No. 1 stuff was selling freely today from \$1 to \$1.25, while inferior grades were going as low as 55¢ per crate. California cauliflower is still coming in but is meeting stiff competition from the Empqua valley offerings.

Wheat Rallies In Opening Trading

CHICAGO, Mar. 16 (AP)—Corn started 1/2 to 3/4¢ higher, and later scored sharp additional gains. Wheat after opening at 1/4¢ off to 1/2¢ up, rose all around. Oats were firmer. Provisions showed strength.

Corn closed strong, 1 to 2¢ net higher, wheat varying from 1/4¢ decline to 1 1/2¢ advance, oats 1/4 to 3/4¢ up, and provisions showing 10¢ to 32¢ gain.

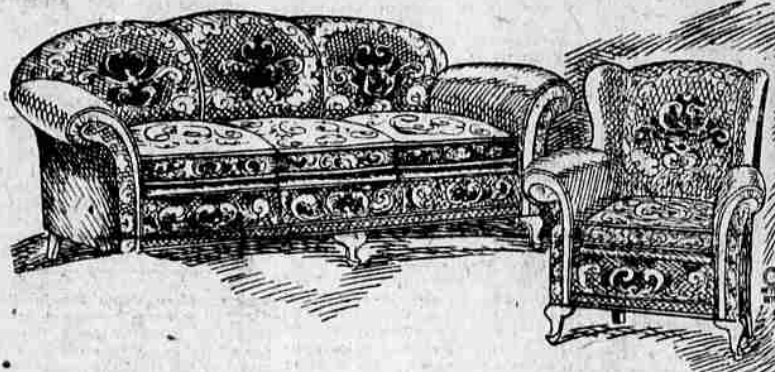
