Mr. and Mrs. Baker went to Baker Tuesday, and had to be pulled out of the mud going both ways. They stayed all night at Elmer Kennedy's.

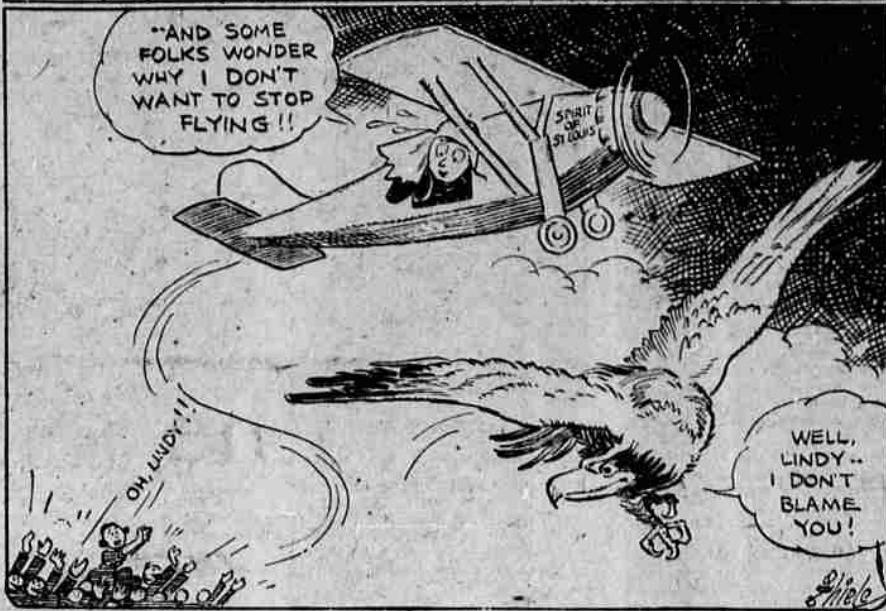
ENTERPRISE PERSONALS
