Bridge Pointers

Continuing the subject of No Trump bids, started last Saturday we first note that three suits stopped and high cards better than the average are the requirements which justify an initial No Trump. Postponing the discussion of No Trump strength until later, we will proceed to explain the meaning of "stoppers" and "stopped suits."

When a Declarer is playing No Trump, he has no chance to get in the lead by trumping; consequently he dreads the possibility that his adversaries will open a suit in which neither Closed Hand nor Dummy can take a trick. When the adversaries can take as many as five tricks in the first suit led, there are not enough tricks left to enable Declarer to go game; consequently, it is important that Declarer have a winning card with which he can "stop" the suit. Such a card is a "stopper" and the suit in which it is held is a "stopped suit." When the initial No Trump bid is made, the bidder can see only the stoppers in his own hand and should not rely upon his prospective Dummy to stop more than one of the four suits; that is why we say that the bidder must have at least three suits stopped.

Now let us consider what will stop a suit if it be selected by the adversary on the left of the No Trumpers as the first lead. It is

Steamed lamb is an economical dish worth using often.

Steamed Lamb With Parsnips and Creamed Peas

Three pounds breast of lamb, 4 parsnips, 1 cup cooked peas, 2 tablespoons butter, 1 tablespoon flour, 1 cup milk, 1/2 teaspoon salt.

Steam lamb until tender, about two and one-half hours. Save liquid under steamer for broth. Scrub and pare parsnips, cut in slices and cook in boiling salted water until tender. Drain and arrange in a border around lamb on hot platter. Melt butter, stir in flour and salt and slowly add milk, stirring constantly. Bring to the boiling point and add peas. Make very hot and pour over lamb and parsnips.

obvious that an Ace will do so regardless of whether it be a singleton or accomplished by one or more small cards. A singleton King may or may not accomplish the purpose, but a King with one or more small ones certainly will as the suit is led up to it. A singleton Queen, or one supported by one or two small cards, may stop the suit; but there is a good chance that it will not, so neither of these holdings can be relied upon as a sure stopper. However a Queen with three small cards, especially if one of them be as high as a Nine, is reasonably dependable. Other sure stoppers are Queen-Jack and at least one other, and Jack-Ten and at least two others. Taking everything into consideration, a suit should not be called "stopped" unless it contains at least: an Ace, a King with one or more others, and Queen with a Nine or higher card and two others; a Queen-Jack and at least one other, or a Jack-Ten and at least two others. When an initial bidder has in three suits any one of the above combinations, his hand fulfills that portion of the No Trump requirement which provides that three suits should be stopped. The other part of the No Trump requirement is that a

strong. If a player had one Jack, his holding would be exactly "average" and if he held even a Jack in addition, he would be better than average and have borderline No Trump strength. The subject of average strength will be continued next Saturday.

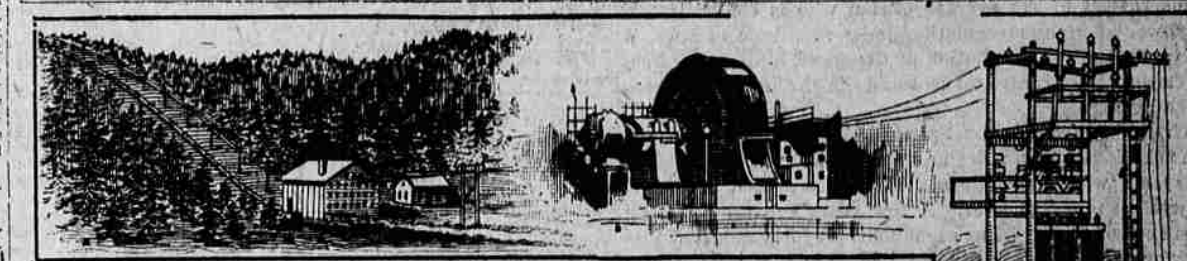
