Special Church Programs Will Be Given Sunday

Dr. George H. Hillerman Will Begin Lenten Mission; Stereopticon Lecture Will Be Given

Many programs of special interest will be given in the churches of the city Sunday. A Lenten mission to be conducted under the leadership of Dr. George H. Hillerman for the next week at the English Lutheran church will begin Sunday morning. There will be a musical program Sunday night at the First Presbyterian church and a stereopticon lecture at the First Methodist Episcopal church, in addition to the regular services in all of the houses of worship for which good programs have been arranged.

English Lutheran Church
Dr. Hillerman, who will speak at the English Lutheran church Sunday morning, is general superintendent of the American board of missions of the United Lutheran church for the west coast. He will speak at the Lutheran church here every night for the next week, except Saturday. Sunday morning his subject will be "The Fact of Divine Co-operation," which will be a discussion of several vital questions, such as: "What three characteristics of God render His co-operation indispensable and invaluable? How much capability and equipment does God require of His human helpers? What is the prime duty of the church today? What is the requirement laid down to secure the reward? What is the big disgrace of Christian lives?"

In the evening Dr. Hillerman will talk on the subject "The fact of God," in which he will discuss

the question: "What two facts of matter deny the present claims of evolution? Recognizing God's wisdom, love and power how can we explain the wrongs we see, reconcile the fact of pain and the persistence of evil? What assurance is there that right will prevail? What is really God's attitude toward the human race?"

Sunday school will precede the morning service. The choir will furnish special music.

First Presbyterian Church
In addition to the musical program at the First Presbyterian church Sunday evening there will be an interesting service in the morning when the pastor, the Rev. J. George Wink, will speak on the subject "Gathering Up the Fragments." The choir, under the direction of Mrs. A. L. Richardson, will sing "He In Tears That Sowed" by Hiller. This anthem is taken from Hiller's "A Song of Victory" and is beautifully expressive of the reward for faithful service.

Sunday school meets at 9:45 o'clock, the Junior Christian Endeavor at three o'clock in the afternoon and the Intermediate, Senior and young people's Christian Endeavor societies at 6:30 o'clock in the evening.

First M. E. Church
There will be a stereopticon lecture on Chile, "The Shattering Republic" by Charles S. Braden Sunday evening at 7:30 o'clock at the First Methodist Episcopal church. This lecture opens with a view of the Andes. The journey across the Andes mountains from Chile into Argentina is considered by travelers one of the greatest scenic trips of the world, and this will be shown during the lecture, also a view of Aconcagua, the highest mountain in the new world, rising 22,916 feet above the sea.

Bible school is at 9:45 o'clock in the morning and Epworth League meets at 6:30 o'clock in the evening. The regular morning service at 11 o'clock will be conducted by the pastor. At this service Mrs. George Richardson and Miss Mima Cooper will sing "Hark, Hark My Soul" by Harry Rowe Shelley.

Episcopal Church
"Inadequate Views of Jesus" will be the subject of the sermon given by the Rev. Oliver Riley, rector of St. Peter's Episcopal church, Sunday morning during the 11 o'clock hour of worship. Mrs. H. N. Ashby will sing a solo "Hold Thou My Hand" by Briggs. Holy Eucharist begins the day's worship at eight o'clock in the morning and the church school meets at 9:45 o'clock. The Wayfarers' guild meets at six o'clock at Honan hall.

There will be a service on Christian healing in the evening at 7:30 o'clock. "Faith in Time of Need" will be the subject of the address which will be given by Dr. Riley.

Central Christian Church
During the period between now and Easter Sunday the Central Christian church will carry out a program of evangelism. Sunday morning the subject of the sermon which will be given by the pastor, the Rev. R. L. Putnam, during the 11 o'clock hour, will be "Silent Evangelism." This service will follow the Bible school, which meets at 9:45 o'clock, and in addition to the sermon there will be special music by the choir.

The four Christian Endeavor societies, the Junior, Intermediate, young people and senior societies, meet at 6:30 o'clock at the church. In the evening, beginning at 7:30 o'clock, there will be an evangelistic service, when the pastor will give a sermon on "Drifting Sodom." Preceding the sermon there will be a song service with the orchestra and the young people's choir assisting.

Island City Church
The Rev. H. L. Hansen, pastor of the Island City Community church, will speak on the subject "Three Life Secrets" Sunday morning during the 11 o'clock hour of worship. The evening subject will be "Life a Mission."

Sunday school opens at ten o'clock in the morning and the morning church services are at 11. The Epworth League society meets at seven o'clock in the evening, and is followed by the evening church services at eight o'clock.
