HUSBAND DENIES WIFE IS GUILTY

Continue Efforts to Save Doris Palmer McDonald From the Gallows

VALLEYFIELD, Que., Mar. 19 (AP)—Efforts to save 26-year-old Doris Palmer McDonald from the gallows today had the support of an affidavit by her husband, George C. McDonald, declaring her innocent of the murder of the taxi driver for which the two have been sentenced to hang on Friday.

McDonald's affidavit, made in Bordeaux jail in Montreal and made public by his attorney, J. A. Legault, reads:

"This is to certify that my wife Doris Palmer McDonald, now in jail in Montreal, is innocent of the murder of T. Bonchard. I swear to this by my God in heaven. She had not one thing to do in the murder or helped in any way, and the Denver confession is untrue."

The body of Bonchard was found last summer along a road near the international border a short time after he had been hired by the McDonalds and a male companion to drive them over the boundary. The McDonalds were arrested in Denver, but the third member of the trio was never arrested. Mrs. McDonald is a companion distributed to her by her husband. She fired the shots which caused Bonchard's death.

Equalization Fee of McNary Bill Accepted

WASHINGTON, March 19 (AP)—The equalization fee provision of the McNary-Haugen farm relief bill was accepted today by the house agricultural committee but an action was taken.

Chairman Haugen said that he expected the committee, which for several weeks has been considering the bill in executive session, would vote tomorrow or the next day on whether the fee would be retained in the measure.

The committee today approved a section of the bill to give the proposed federal farm board authority to enter into "marketing agreements" for distribution of agricultural produce.

GIRL FAITHFUL TO EARL JONES

Believes in Boy Accused of Fatal Explosion at Boring, Ore.

PORTLAND, Ore., Mar. 19 (AP)—Earl Jones, 19, held at Oregon City in connection with an explosion which wrecked his home at Boring, last Thursday, resulting in two deaths, was promised a trip to Portland today to visit his father, Robert H. Jones, in a hospital.

Sheriff E. T. Mass this morning announced the visit, expecting conversation of father and son to throw some light on the case.

Meantime District Attorney Livy Stipp planned to take the case before the Clackamas county grand jury tomorrow. The coroner's jury Saturday night fixed no blame, merely recording that the victim came to their death by an explosion of stump powder.

Sweetheart Faithful

Faith in the innocence of Earl Jones was expressed by his sweetheart, Miss Irene Schweitzer, of Boring, the Portland Telegram says today. The girl, a pretty blonde, was emphatic in declaring that she was certain that Earl had nothing to do with causing the explosion of the powder which had been placed in a box beneath the Jones home.

PROMINENT EDITOR DIES

CLEVELAND, Mar. 19 (AP)—Eric G. Hopwood, editor of the Cleveland Plain Dealer, died at his home last night of a heart attack. Hopwood was 51 and had been editor of the paper since 1920. He had been identified with its editorial staff since 1902. Starting in 1906 as a staff reporter, he succeeded by becoming city editor, night editor, managing editor and editor.

He had served for several years as president of the American Society of newspaper editors.
