MARKET LIMELIGHTBoth Strong, with Movement
Large as Week
Opens in PortlandPORTLAND, Ore., Mar. 19 (AP)—
Potatoes and onions were holding
the center of interest today on
the wholesale produce markets
with both markets strong and
movement large. It is estimated
that only about 20 cars of Oregon
yellow Danvers remain in this
territory and it is probable that
they will be cleaned up this week.
Last bids by buyers in growing
districts Saturday were around \$3
and sacks, but growers were in-
clined to hold off and little moved
at that price.Movement of potatoes from this
region continues heavy and the
market was somewhat overstocked but
values were firm. Reports that
frost damage in Texas may injure
the crop of new potatoes to the
extent of 25 to 30 per cent are
leading bullishness to the local out-
look. Latest bids to growers Sat-
urday were mostly around \$1.25
and sacks and hauling, although a
few cars of unusually fine pota-
toes netted growers \$1.50, uncon-
firmed reports say. Buyers were
holding off early today.Butter and egg prices were un-
changed today from Saturday. Re-
ceipts of eggs continue heavy and
movement into storage is steady.
There were 3019 cases in storage
at the close Saturday.Country dressed meats and poul-
try were in light supply this morn-
ing with practically nothing car-
ried over from Saturday. Prices
on all classes were steady and in-
quiry fairly large.

exports of merchandise from Ore-
gon were valued at \$27,224,961
compared with \$23,778,876 during
the corresponding period of 1926,
an increase of \$3,446,085, accord-
ing to figures made public today
by the department of commerce.
Wheat, valued at \$19,255,011,
ranked first in order of value
among the commodities sent from
the state to foreign markets dur-
ing the three-month period. Ex-
ports of boards, planks and scant-
lings, valued at \$2,214,629, were
followed in order by sawed timber
softwoods, \$1,237,116; wheat flour,
\$1,019,917; logs and brown timber,
\$564,734; wood manufactures, ex-
cept of boards, planks and scant-
lings, valued at \$414,901; and
milk and cream \$344,375.Pickled salmon, canned salmon,
cattle hides, apples, prunes, canned
and prepared fruits and other veg-
etable products and beverages, ex-
cept of hops, binder twine, in-
edible vegetable products, non-me-
tallurgical products, metals and man-
ufactures of metals, machinery, ve-
hicles and parts, and chemicals and
related products were among the
diversified commodities exported
during the three months.
