RADIO, MOTORS
STOCKS CLIMBClosing Strong in Wall St.
with Sales of About
3,500,000 SharesNEW YORK, Mar. 20 (AP)—
Another burst of buying in radio
on the stock exchange today rushed
the price up to \$169 a share for
a gain of \$22, from yesterday's
closing quotation, duplicating the
year's high figure. Large orders
for General Motors common also
carried that issue to \$174 a share,
a gain of \$6. Other stocks in which
pools have been active were whirled
upward, among them U. S. Steel
Iron Pipe and Foundry, which
touched \$250 for an advance of \$15.The closing was strong. The mar-
ket absorbed profit-taking sales
well as the uprush of prices car-
ried Radio Corporation to 158 1/2
and General Motors to 173 1/2; keen
opposition on the stocks caused
some additional notable advances.
Russia Insurance gained 11 points,
A. M. Byers, 6, and Electric Auto-
Life, 5 1/2. Mackay Company, after
er touching 134, broke to 129 1/2.
Toward the close, radio broke over
7 points on profit-taking. Sales
approximated 3,500,000 shares.NEW YORK, Mar. 20 (AP)—
Radio and General Motors led an-
other violent upturn in prices
which lifted more than a score of
issues to new high records on the
New York stock exchange today.
Radio soared \$15.50 a share to
\$162.50, or \$6.50 below the record
high established last week, and
General Motors advanced \$5 a
share to a new high record at \$174.
U. S. Iron Pipe climbed \$15 a share
to a new peak at \$250 and nume-
ous others advanced \$3 to \$6 a

Onions Go HighPORTLAND, Ore., Mar. 20 (AP)—
Onion values took a slight up-
ward turn in growing districts yester-
day with buyers reported as bid-
ding \$2.25 and sacks. There re-
main only a few carloads unsold in
growers' hands, estimates running
from 20 to 25 cars, and it is ex-
pected that everything will be
cleaned up by the first of the
month.Potato prices were likewise very
firm with quotations to the trade
here around \$2.25 per cwt. for De-
shutes netted gems and around
\$1.75 for local offerings.
Cauliflower was plentiful and
prices show a wide range. Rose-
burg offerings were selling around
75c @ \$1.25 per crate, according to
size and grade, while California
stuff (mostly large heads) is bring-
ing as high as \$1.60 per crate.Except for a half-cent decline
in the quotation on firsts, butter
prices were unchanged. Eggs were
likewise steady and unchanged. Re-
ceipts of butter yesterday were 10-
700 pounds, while eggs were 1,497
cases.
Outside of a trifle firmer under-
tone in the pork division, country
dressed meats were steady today.
Poultry markets were also quiet
early today with supplies moderate
and trading light. No changes in
prices were noticeable.Wheat Closes Firm
After Hitting SagCHICAGO, Mar. 20 (AP)—Start-
ing at a shade to 1c gain, Chicago
wheat afterward underwent a sag.
Corn, oats and provisions also were
firmer, at times, corn opening 1/4
to 3/8c higher but later reacting to
below yesterday's finish.
Wheat closed firm, 1/2 to 3/8c
net higher; corn 1 1/2c up; oats
1/4c off to 3/8c up, and provisions
unchanged to a rise of 1/8c.

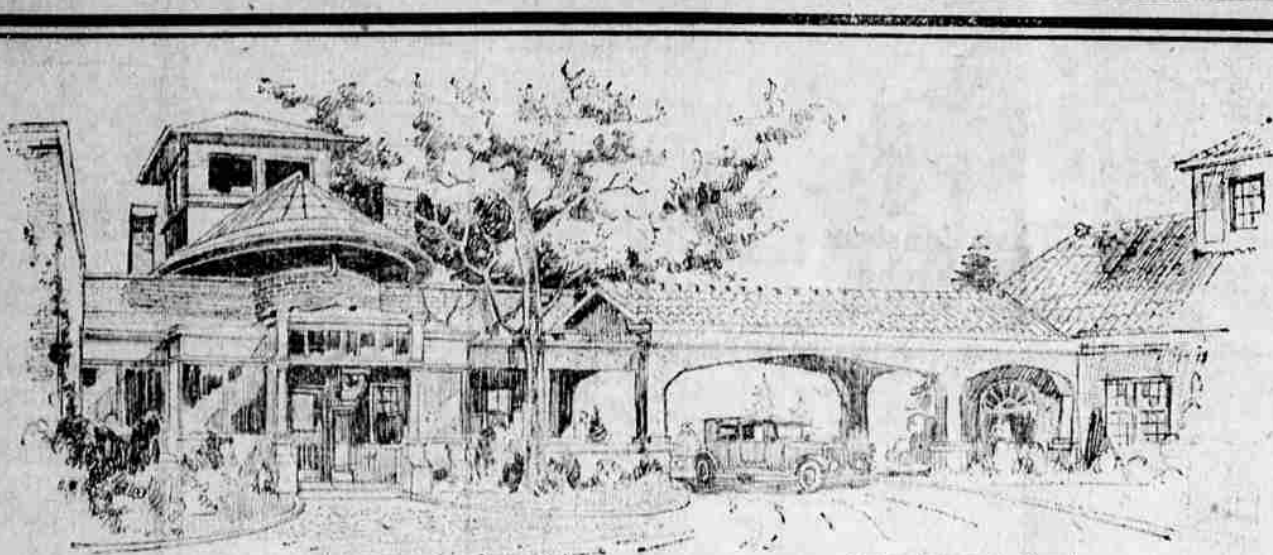
