New Iowa Oats, Iogold, Immune To Stem Rust

AMES, Ia. (AP)—Iogold, new variety of oats, said by L. C. Burnett of the agronomy section of the Iowa State college experiment station, to yield as much or more than the best varieties heretofore grown, has just been introduced to agriculturists.
The new variety is virtually totally immune to stem rust. It was developed from a single plant of Kherson oats. Another desirable feature claimed for Iogold is that the plant has a very stiff straw and will stand up on rich soil where other varieties lodge badly. Burnett also developed Iowa 105, Iowa 106, Iowar, and Iogren oats.

Beautiful Cavern Found in Saxony

BERLIN, Mar. 21. (AP)—Several new, large stalactite caverns containing lakes, waterfalls and hundreds of wonderful stalactites and stalagmites have been accidentally discovered near the flying field at Plauen, Saxony.
The caverns were discovered by a workman who dropped a heavy steel bolt from the top of a quarry, the bolt crashing through the earth and exposing the opening of the cave.
The main cave is 370 feet long and 150 feet wide. The entrance has been sealed pending examination by experts.

Gangsters Murder Two in Cleveland

CLEVELAND, Mar. 21. (AP)—Morris Nadel, bootlegger who shielded Pat McCormick, one of those convicted of the killing of Don R. Mellett, Canton editor, and an unidentified companion were found slain in their automobile on a lonely road near here this morning.
Nadel's head and shoulders had 12 bullet wounds while seven bullets had entered his companion's body. Authorities said they apparently had been shot from the rear seat after being induced to take at least two grains for a ride. The killers escaped in another machine, investigators said.
