NAVAJO, Ariz., Mar. 22 (AP)—Arne Suominen of Detroit, led in elapsed time again today as the runners in the Los Angeles to New York marathon lined up for a 33-mile hunt to Lupton, Ariz. Suominen covered the 41.8 miles from Holbrook to Navajo yesterday in 6 hours 47 minutes and 55 seconds, to trail Ed Gardner, Seattle, by more than 8 minutes. Andrew Payne of Claremore, Okla., who relinquished the lead to Suominen Tuesday when he suffered an attack of tonsillitis, managed to retain second place at the end of the 661.8-mile route but he required nearly eight hours for the trip from Holbrook. Withdrawal Tuesday of Herbert Tiedjeck, Hollywood, Cal.; Harry Choetham, Los Angeles and Giacomo Clarazo, reduced the field to 26.

FIGHT BOARD MAY SUSPEND TUNNEY

New York Commission to Consider Action—Geo. Godfrey Challenges

NEW YORK, Mar. 22 (AP)—The New York state athletic commission tomorrow may consider the advisability of suspending Gene Tunney, world's heavyweight champion. The commission yesterday announced receipt of a telegram from the champion in which Tunney said he had signed with Tex Rickard to defend his title "against the best available opponent as soon as Rickard has arranged to sign his selection and stake the contest." The telegram, which was in reply to one from the commission, however, failed to deal specifically with the challenges now on file here of Tom Heeney, Jack Sharkey and Johnny Risio. The commission in its telegram to Tunney had informed the champion that his six months period of grace expired today and asked him what he was going to do with the challenges.

GODFREY CHALLENGES

LOS ANGELES, Mar. 22 (AP)—George Godfrey, negro, through the medium of a challenge, has thrust his massive frame and hammer-like fists to the fore of the leather pushing field rampaged on Gene Tunney's trail, seeking a title duel with the champion. "The black menace," through his manager, Jim Dougherty, sent forth last night the word that he is ready to fight Tunney at any time, any place and for any consideration. He made this known in a letter to Tex Rickard, Madison Square Garden promoter, and the New York boxing commission. A demand that Godfrey's name be put ahead of other challengers being considered at the present was made of the boxing commission. It added that the \$2,500 forfeit, necessary accompaniment to a challenge, was being sent.

NOTICE OF CLOSING STREAMS AND LAKES

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN,

That by an order duly and regularly made by the State Game Commission of the State of Oregon, on the 14th day of February, 1928, it was found and determined that the supply of trout and other fish in being, and will be, injuriously affected by permitting the same to be taken with hook and line, commonly called angling, during the periods of time hereinafter specified from the streams and lakes of the State of Oregon hereinafter named, therefore:

IT IS HEREBY ORDERED,

That on and after the 15th day of April, 1928, it shall be unlawful for any person to angle for, take, kill or have in possession, except as hereinafter provided, any species of trout or other fish of any kind or species in or from the following named and described streams and lakes of the State of Oregon, during the periods of time hereinafter specified, in accordance with the provisions of Section 8, Chapter 65, General Laws of Oregon, 1921, as amended by Section 1, Chapter 275, General Laws of Oregon, 1925, to-wit:

Rock Creek, situated in Benton county, closed for a period of ten years.

All that part of the Willamette River, situated in Clackamas county, beginning at a point on Black Point at the west corner of Hawley Paper & Pulp Company's Electric Light Station, situated on the west bank of said river, thence running in a southwesterly direction across said river to a point on the island in line with the corner of the Crown Willamette Paper Company's Pulp Mill, situated on the west bank of said river; thence in a southerly direction to the dead-line established by an act of the State Legislature, 200 feet below the highway over the Willamette Falls in said river; thence following said dead-line across said river to the east bank thereof; thence in a northerly direction to the place of beginning at the west corner of the Hawley Paper & Pulp Company's Electric Station on Black Point, closed for a period of five years.

All that part of the Willamette River, situated in Clackamas county, and known as the Tall Race of the Crown Willamette Paper Company, beginning at a point near the mouth of said Tall Race on the south bank thereof, thence extending across said Tall Race following the line established by the bridge across said Tall Race to the north bank thereof; thence in a westerly, southerly and westerly direction around the bank of said Tall Race to the place of beginning, closed for a period of ten years.

Klaskanine river, situated in Clatsop county, beginning at Barth Falls, approximately three miles above the State Fish Hatchery, located on said river, and extending down said river to the junction of the South Fork with said Klaskanine river, closed to May 15 of each year for a period of ten years.

Olive Lake, Lake Creek Reservoir, and Lake Creek, situated in Grant county, closed to July 1 of each year for a period of ten years.

Middle Fork of the John Day River, situated in Grant county, from a point three miles below the town of Austin in said county, to its source, including all tributaries thereof above said closing point, closed for a period of five years.

Blue Lake, Campbell Lake and Dead Horse Lake, situated in Lake county, closed from September 1 to July 15 of each year for a period of ten years.

Munsel Lake, Colliard Lake, Clear Lake and Ackerly Lake, situated in Lane county, closed to July 15, 1929.
