## STRONG TREMOR STRIKES MEXICO

**Five Injured in Mexico City—Several Casualties Reported in Oaxaca**

MEXICO CITY, Mar. 22 (AP)—A strong earthquake, perceptible for seven minutes in Mexico City, struck Mexico at 1:20 o'clock last night. Five persons were injured in the capital by stones which crumbled from houses, and numerous casualties were reported in special dispatches from Oaxaca. Startled by the tremors and shaken in the theaters became panic-stricken and rushed wildly to the streets, many women fainting. Although the seismograph at the Tacubaya observatory was first reported thrown out of order by the shocks, the observatory today issued a bulletin stating that the earthquake lasted 25 minutes 43 seconds during which the tremor was perceptible for seven minutes. The bulletin placed the center of the quake about 200 miles southwest of Mexico City. Special dispatches from Oaxaca said that several houses were destroyed, with numerous casualties the number of which is not known. The quake also was felt in the city of Vera Cruz and in Puebla but no damages were reported in those cities.

## All-Meat Diet Tested Out By Mr. Stefansson

NEW YORK, Mar. 22 (AP)—After three weeks on an all-meat diet, Vilhjalmur Stefansson, Arctic explorer, declares he feels more optimistic, ambitious and energetic, and ascribes this to his dietary experiment. When he started the experiment on Feb. 26 he felt "lacking in vitality, getting up in the morning," but now he feels like "jumping out of bed and getting right to work." The test was conducted at Bellevue hospital under auspices of the Russell Sage foundation of pathology, which has been studying diets since 1913. The foundation announced that the only conclusion it could draw at this time was that an all-meat diet was as satisfactory in New York as in the Arctic. During seven of the 11 years he spent in the Arctic Stefansson lived entirely on meat. Eskimos who eat nothing but meat never have nervous and are in perfect health, he says.

land all form important links in this field, he said. A well equipped airport should be part of the facilities of every progressive city, he declared. Survey of Oregon—A complete survey of airport facilities in Oregon was given by A. L. Lemax, professor of business administration at the University of Oregon. Kwan Island port in Portland was given high praise, and progress made by other cities in Oregon was described. Baker and Pendleton both have promising fields and the people are interested in developing them, he said. Medford had an airport since 1924 and it had been steadily improved. Salem has a well situated, convenient to the city, for which the community is now raising \$50,000. Silverton has a promising location which should put it on the map in this line. Grants Pass, La Grande, Lebanon, Lakeview and other cities were mentioned as being interested in airport development and great progress in this field is predicted for these cities. Astoria, Ashland, Klamath Falls, Bend, Marshfield and several other cities were cited as excellent locations for fields, and the prediction was made that developments should be under way in these localities in the near future. Air routes in Oregon will prove to be especially valuable for interesting prospective settlers in the country, declared Mr. Lemax. A farmer from the East could take a trip from Eugene, Salem, Albany or other state points, and in an hour or two get an accurate idea of the lay of the agricultural land for many miles. Tourists could also take these trips for pleasure, he pointed out, and a substantial business in this line is predicted.
