"Hero For Night" Opens At Arcade Friday

For those interested in aviation—and who is not these days—the remarkable strides made in construction of airplanes in the last 10 years is readily shown in the Universal-Lewy production, "A Hero for a Night," which comes to the Arcade theater Friday and Saturday.

Glenn Tryon, who with Patsy Ruth Miller is starred in the picture, is a correspondence school aviator who builds his own plane in order to enter a race across the Atlantic. The property department at Universal City scouted around and found a plane of the now obsolete "pusher" type, that was made famous by Lincoln Beachey a dozen years ago. This type of plane, as many will remember, has the engine directly over the pilot, who sits well out in front of the rest of the machine. No such thing as the fuselage was known at that time, and there was only a strap between the pilot and oblivion.

The plane caused considerable comment when it was wheeled on the landing field at Clover field, California, and many skeptics of the younger generation were very open in their statements that such a plane had never been in the air. Al Wilson, noted stunt aviator and Universal star, promptly showed them that such a plane had been up in the air by taking it up for a trial spin. It behaved admirably in the air, but Wilson admitted that a 1927 model is easier to handle.

"A Hero for a Night" is directed by William James Craft from a story of the same name by Harry O. Hoyt. The cast supporting Tryon and Miss Miller includes Burr Melrose, Lloyd Whitlock, Ruth Dwyer, Bob Milash and many others.
