Bridge Pointers

Last Saturday I explained that an "average" hand contains one Ace, one King, one Queen and one Jack; and that any hand containing a Jack in addition would have the borderline strength (although it might not have the "stoppers") for No Trump.

When the hand contains exactly one Ace, one King, one Queen and one Jack, plus one other Ace or face, anybody can see that it is better than average; but when it does not contain one of each of the four top honors, but contains some such combination as two Aces, two Queens, and two Jacks; the beginner may be in considerable doubt as to whether it is above or below an average holding.

To meet this situation, an easy count may be used: Reckon on Ace as 4, a King and a Queen as 2 and a Jack as 1. Based on this reckoning, an average hand would count 10, and consequently any hand which counted 11 or more would be better than average and would fulfill the strength requirement for a No Trump.

To illustrate, let us examine two hands.

Hand No. 1: A-K-Q-J, A-K-Q-J. Hand No. 2: A-K-Q-J, A-K-Q-J.

(x) represents any card lower than a Ten.

It will be noted that the first of the two combinations given above "counts" 12 and would qualify, while the second counts 10 and would not.

It may be well to add in passing that this 4-3-2-1 count is useful for purposes outside of initial bidding and will be referred to again in the course of these lessons.

There is one point in connection with all bidding which a beginner should remember: that is, that he must expect to "miss a trick" in the play oftener than an experienced player would, and therefore an experienced player is justified in taking bidding risks which a beginner should not chance.

The No Trump bidding rule given above is provided to meet the demands of expert players and therefore the beginner should be more conservative than the rule would require.

While it may be wise for an expert to bid No Trump with some hands which have three suits stopped and a count of 11, a beginner should make a count of 12 his minimum.

canned fruit, plain cake, milk, coffee.

Jellied tomato salad is excellent for this time of year when fresh tomatoes are high in price.

There are many ways to vary the seasoning in the tomato jolly and either French or mayonnaise dressing is good.

The following rule is unusual in that grated coconut is added.

Jellied Tomato Salad Two cups, canned tomatoes, 1 small onion, 1 teaspoon salt, 1 teaspoon sugar, 2 tablespoons lemon juice, 1/2 tablespoons gelatine, 4 tablespoons cold water, 1/2 cup grated coconut.

Peel and slice onion and add to tomatoes. Add salt and sugar and simmer fifteen minutes. Soften gelatine in cold water for ten minutes. Strain tomatoes through sieve and stir in softened gelatine.

Stir until dissolved and add lemon juice and coconut. Turn into four individual molds and let stand until chilled and firm. Turn out on lettuce and serve with French dressing.

When horses are troubled with heaves it usually is because of digestive troubles due to wrong or careless feeding.

The disease is incurable because it leads to the rupture of small air sacs in the lungs. It usually is caused by feeding damaged hay or straw, roughage that is too bulky and lacking in nutritive value and keeping the horse in a dusty atmosphere or in a badly ventilated stable.
