Christian Endeavor societies will meet at 6:30 o'clock in the evening.

The evening services at 7:30 o'clock will open with a song service, the orchestra and young people's choir assisting, and the pastor will speak on the subject "Your Soul as God Sees It." Baptismal services will follow the sermon.

Dr. Hillerman Ends La Grande Mission

Dr. George H. Hillerman addressed a large crowd last evening at the English Lutheran church on the subject "The Fact of Eternity." Tomorrow the one-week Lenten mission, which has been conducted by him during the last week, will close.

"Standing in the shadow of eternity three things force themselves on our vision—judgment, retribution and heaven," Dr. Hillerman told his audience. "Of judgment there is no question. It stands certified, not only by the scriptures which declare 'So then each one of us shall give account of himself to God,' but just as truly by the analogy of this life. No man, in the realm of natural things, questions the declaration. 'Whoever sows a man sows that shall be also reap; and no man can set aside the wider application thereof. He that sows of the flesh shall of the flesh reap corruption, and he that sows of the spirit shall of the spirit reap eternal life.' And to each of us here and now is entrusted the sowing. What shall that sowing be? For on it rests the issue of the harvest."

Dr. Hillerman will not speak tonight and tomorrow he will give two sermons, in the morning and evening at the Lutheran church. Subjects for these addresses are given on today's church page.

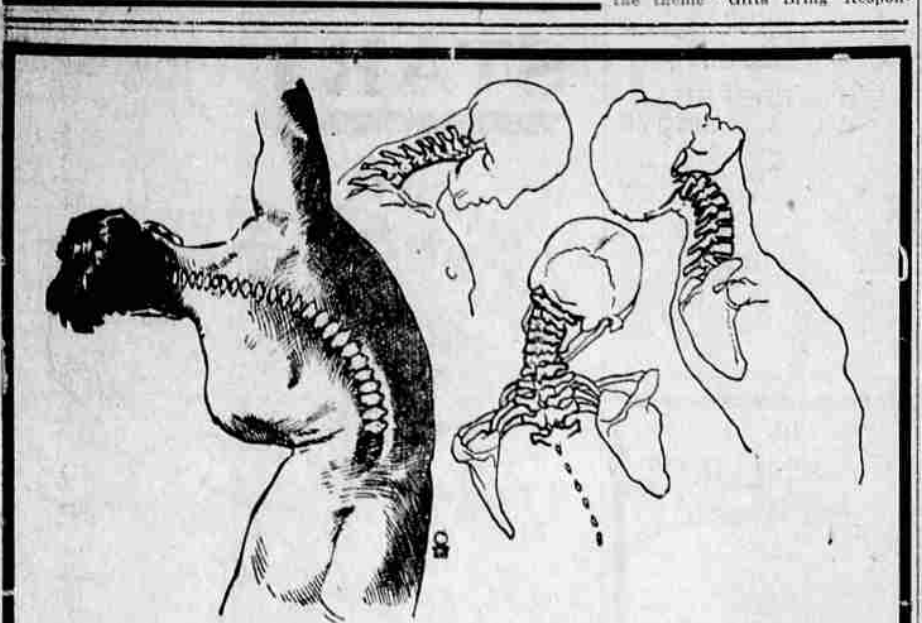
