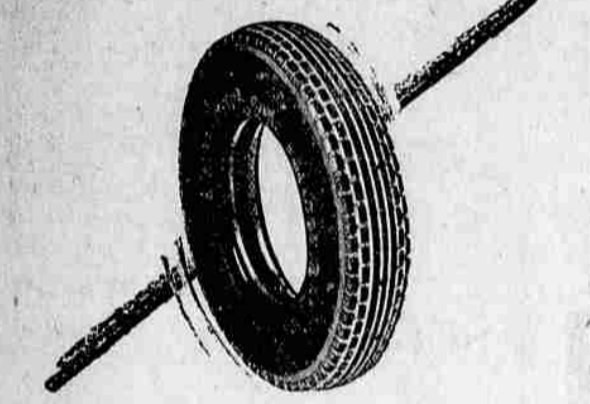

OLD LAGUNA PUEBLA, N. M., Mar. 27 (AP)—With an arduous trek of approximately 48 miles of hard country facing them the 96 standbys in the trans-continental marathon left here today for Los Lunas, N. M., 24th control of the 2400-mile journey east.

Wednesday night the caravan will encamp on the desert about 38 miles east of Los Lunas after skirting Albuquerque, N. M., during the day.

But 21 minutes separate Payne and Gavuzal for second place in elapsed time.

SALEM, Ore., Mar. 27 (AP)—Dale Pointer, who escaped from the state penitentiary in 1923 was returned Sunday from Reno, Nev., and will serve out his original sentence of one year.
Pointer was first received in 1922 from Jefferson county for stealing a calf. He was paroled May 1, 1922. He was received again April 14, 1923 from Harney county for horse stealing. He escaped 29 days later and was not heard from again until three months ago when he was arrested at Reno for a minor offense. Upon finishing his sentence he was turned over to a guard from the Oregon penitentiary and returned here.
