GET-TOGETHER
MEETING HELD
LAST NIGHT

Representatives from Various Organizations Gather at Eagles Hall

BEN OSBORNE IS
AMONG SPEAKERS

That Aim of All Organizations Is Upbuilding of La Grande and Community Is Stressed.

Representatives from the La Grande Central Labor council, the chamber of commerce, the Rotary club, the city of La Grande, the public schools, the granges of Union county and the various labor unions of La Grande met for a get-together banquet last evening at Eagles hall for the first meeting of this kind ever to be held in La Grande. About 150 persons were present.

The banquet was sponsored by the central labor council, and the purpose was to get together on a common ground and discuss matters of interest to every organization represented—principally the upbuilding of La Grande and community.

Max O. Cullen, president of the central labor council, presided as toastmaster, and after music by Andrew Loney's orchestra and the offering of thanks by the Rev. H. L. Putnam the guests present at the banquet were introduced.

The first speaker introduced by the toastmaster was A. T. Hill, president of the city commission, who in a short talk mentioned the recent city improvements. Frank McKennon, representing the grange and the chamber of commerce, realized the idea of such a meeting, after which he touched upon the new economic conditions making the raising of wheat at a profit difficult. He declared that the changing of production was one possible way of bettering conditions, but that this was difficult. He discussed the home market survey, which is being sponsored by the chamber of commerce with the idea of meeting new conditions, the purpose of which is to adjust the market to meet local demands and to educate the consumer to use local products.

Opposes \$3 License Fee
Frank Wright from the Blue Mountain grange was the next speaker. He declared that he believed signs are for the better. He mentioned the things that the grange stands for and explained the delinquent plan for marketing. He also declared that the grange had already gone on record against the \$3 automobile fee, but was in favor of the eighteenth amendment and the income tax law.

George McVey, representing the union workers, spoke on cooperation discussing "Wages and Means" to build up a community. He stressed the importance of working together and of investing money at home, and the need of some specific attraction to La Grande. He mentioned the need of a theater here and the organization of a company of players.

Robert C. Ayers spoke for the Rotary club, declaring the betterment of La Grande and community is the common aim of all organizations represented at the meeting. "The city where you live is where your common interest lies," Mr. Ayers declared. "The character of a community is important, and in La Grande it is good." He explained briefly the workings of the Rotary club as a civic service organization, and expressed the willingness of the Rotary club to back the labor organizations in all worthwhile undertakings.

Funeral services will be held here this coming Sunday afternoon, probably from the Christian church. Mr. Vehr was an active member of the Christian church. Besides the widow, Ernest Vehr, of Oakland, Cal., and Alfred John, William, Otto, of Portland, George of St. Paul, and two daughters, one of whom is Mrs. McKeen, of Los Angeles, survive him. His first wife passed away about 12 years ago.

All or nearly all members of his family are expected to come to La Grande for the funeral.

NOT FAVOR
GOV. SMITH

Sends Reply to Oswald West; Declares He Is for Senator Thos. J. Walsh

OUTLINES HIS OWN
POLITICAL IDEAS

World Peace, Universal Law Enforcement, Power Control, Party Regeneration, Farm Aid Listed

PORTLAND, Ore., Mar. 29 (AP)—Walter M. Pierce, former governor, in a letter today replied to Oswald West, former governor, who had asked Pierce whether reports circulating "in private beer circles" that Pierce favored Gov. Alfred E. Smith of New York for the democratic presidential nomination were correct.

"There said he was for Senator Thomas J. Walsh, of Montana. He launched into a personal attack upon West, asking him 'Is it not a fact that you are a lobbyist for special interests?' Pierce also outlined his own political principles: World peace, universal law enforcement, electric power control, party regeneration and farm relief.

"I wonder by what authority you assume to speak for the democrats of Oregon," Pierce wrote. "If my memory serves me correctly you advocated Herbert Hoover eight years ago for the presidency."

"Many wonder today where you stand on issues besides prohibition. For instance, power, control. You are today advocating a merger of the electric companies in Portland. A few years ago you advocated a merger of the telephone companies, which resulted in greatly increased rates."

"Is it not a fact that you are a lobbyist for the special interests and appeared at every recent session of the Oregon legislature in their behalf?"

"Is it not a fact that you opposed and hampered my administration in every way possible after I refused to allow the state to guarantee the interest upon irrigation bonds sold in central Oregon?"

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LINDBERGH
LEAVES FOR
CINCINNATI

LEXINGTON, Ky., Mar. 29 (AP)—Colonel Charles A. Lindbergh hopped off today. His destination would be Cincinnati.

Despite his desire for quiet the flier was stormed this morning by a group of children who discovered that he was at the home of Dr. Scott Breckinridge, brother of Colonel Henry Breckinridge, Lindbergh's personal attorney.

Lindbergh enjoyed, here in the bluegrass of Kentucky, one of the most restful nights he has known since initiating a new era in aviation by spanning the Atlantic, from New York to Paris in a single hop.

CINCINNATI, Mar. 29 (AP)—Colonel Charles A. Lindbergh made less than a five-minute stop here today. He landed at Lunken airport from Lexington, Ky., dropped off Colonel Henry S. Breckinridge, and took off again without stopping his motor. He was accompanied by Major Thomas G. Lanphier of Selfridge field, Michigan. He did not announce his next stop, but it was believed the destination was St. Louis or Detroit.

Plans Taking Shape for High School
Girls Conference To Be Held Here

Plans for the first Eastern Oregon high school girls' conference, which is to be conducted here by the Associated Girl students of La Grande, with the ultimate aim of encouraging organization of girls' leagues, are rapidly taking shape. Miss Edwina Malone, president of the A. G. S., reported today, the conference opens here tomorrow afternoon at about 2:30 o'clock when, with the visiting girls and local high school girls gathered in the high school auditorium, Miss Alice Margardt will deliver the initial address, "Nursing as a Vocation." Vocational study will be one of the main objects of the conference and will be taken up Saturday. Following the opening assembly a matinee dance will be held at the high school gymnasium. This is one of the features of the program which the A. G. S. has arranged in order to show the visiting girls by actual experience rather than by talks what the girls' league work may accomplish. 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
