## ONLY TWO HORSES FINISH IN RACE

Tiperary Tim Is Winner; American-Bred Horse, Billy Barton, Second

AINTREE, Eng., Mar. 26 (AP)—Only two horses, one of them American bred, of the 42 starters in the historic grand national, finished today in one of the most sensational runnings of this classic event since its inauguration in 1839.

Tiperary Tim, owned by H. S. Kenyon and ridden by J. Dutton, an amateur, proved to have the stamina and luck to win. He was a 100 to 1 shot.

The great American favorite, Billy Barton, owned by Howard Bruce, of Baltimore made a grand race of it but lost his chance to become the first American bred horse to win the historic chase by an unlucky fall at the very last fence. He was remounted, however, by his Irish jockey Cullinan and finished the course, capturing second place.

The rest of the field, jockeys and horses, were littered all over the gruelling ground.

Billy Barton was a 22 to 1 shot. The distance was four miles, 4 1/2 yards.

## Joe Sekyra Will Fight Lomski In Portland Tonight

NEW YORK, Mar. 29 (AP)—Ten rounds and Leo Lomski, the "Aberdeen assassin" stand between Joe Sekyra, 21 year old Dayton, Ohio, light heavyweight, and a chance for a world's title championship.

Sekyra who has fought himself into prominence during a ring career of little more than a year, meets the rugged hard hitting Lomski over the ten-round route at Madison Square Garden tonight. Tommy Loughran, king of the light heavyweights has agreed to defend his crown against the winner.

The odds were 3 to 5 that Lomski would be too great an obstacle for the youthful Sekyra to surmount. There were fears too, in the Dayton boys camp that making 175 pounds, the class limit, would rob Sekyra of some strength that might come in handy when Lomski's right hand plays a tattoo on his body Sekyra rapidly is growing out of the light heavyweight division. Many of his best performance have been against heavyweights.

Lomski, at 24, has 75 battles to look back upon, one of them a defeat at the hands of Loughran early this year. In that bout, Lomski swung that deadly right hand to the champion's chin and Tommy went down twice in the first round for counts of nine. But Lomski could not keep Loughran down and the champion boxed his

## SOUMINEN STILL LEADS IN MARATHON

MORIARITY, N. M., Mar. 29 (AP)—Maintaining his spectacular running, Arne Suominen, Detroit, continued to lead in elapsed time in the cross-country marathon. From Seven Springs to Moriarity a distance of 25.5 miles Suominen averaged better than 7 miles an hour. The Finn's elapsed time for the 92.5 miles travelled so far is 154:32:05.

Suominen now has a lead of three hours, 45 minutes and 31 seconds over Peter Gavuzzi, Southampton England, still holding second berth with elapsed time of 158:20:36. Following Suominen and Gavuzzi, Andrew Payne, Claremore, Okla., placed third yesterday coming in 24 minutes and 11 seconds behind the Englishman.

Today the runners expected to move eastward across the rolling New Mexico prairie toward Palma, their 27th control, 25 miles away. Nestor Erickson, of Port Chester, N. Y., and August Fegar of Ashabula Ohio, dropped out of the Los Angeles to New York marathon race today, as a protest against the dismissal of their trainer and countryman, Alex Finn who was ordered to leave the cross-country caravan for an infraction of the rules. Those in charge of the derby said Finn was dismissed for berating referee Arthur Duffy of Boston.

## DYNAMITE IS FOUND IN PRODUCE HOUSE

CHICAGO, Mar. 29 (AP)—The fuse attached to sixteen eight-inch sticks of dynamite wrapped in black tape was extinguished by a heavy snowfall today after it had been placed at the entrance of a south water street produce building.

# Blindfolded in scientific test of leading Cigarettes James Montgomery Flagg selects

### How Test Was Made

Subject was blindfolded, and, in the presence of two responsible witnesses, was given one of each of the four leading cigarettes to smoke. Coffee was served before each cigarette to clear the taste.
