## Bridge Pointers

Continuing from the point that we reached in yesterday's article on Contract suit-jumps, our subject today will be the high leap that the partner of a Major-suit bidder of one makes when he jumps to four.

It obviously is important to jump from one to four with hands apt to make a game with the aid of an initial bidder who has just exactly the strength for a one-bid should not reach even if his partner jump to three, and therefore the failure to jump to four is apt to pass up a game-going opportunity. The partner of an initial Major-suit one-bidder should jump to three with any of the following hands:

No. 1 No. 2  
Major suit: A-X-X X-X-X  
Minor: A-X-X X  
No. 3 No. 4  
Major suit: A-X A-Q-X  
Minor: A-J-X None  
No. 5 No. 6  
Major suit: A-Q-X X-X-X-X  
Minor: X-X-X A-Q-X

The partner of an initial Major-suit one-bidder should jump to four with any of the following hands:

No. 7 No. 8  
Major suit: K-X-X X-X-X  
Minor: A-X-X None  
No. 9 No. 10  
Major suit: X A-Q-X  
Minor: X-X-X X-Q-X-X-X  
No. 11 No. 12  
Major suit: K-Q-J-X-X X (X-X)  
Minor: X-X-X A-J-Q-X

Elsewhere in these articles I stressed the danger of jumping without adequate strength. That advice still holds good although this week I am pointing out the folly of making a short jump when holding the strength that justifies

## MENUS

By SISTER MARY  
BREAKFAST—Sliced oranges, cereal, cream, soft cooked eggs, crisp toast, milk, coffee.

LUNCHEON—Veal loaf, creamed new carrots, spring onions, bran rolls, medley conserve, milk, tea.

DINNER—Casseroles of smoked salmon, canned green beans, moldered spinach salad, date custard pie, milk, coffee.

When using canned green beans or peas try simmering them in the liquid in the can. Shake the sauce pan frequently to be sure that every vegetable is allowed to come in contact with air and cook over a low fire until juice is almost completely cooked away. Then season with butter. Salt will be needed very sparingly if at all.

Medley Conserve  
One-half pound dried peaches, 1/2 pound dried apricots, 1 pound prunes, 2 oranges, 1/2 cup seedless raisins, 1/2 cup chopped nut meats, 3 cups sugar.

Wash the fruit through many waters. Cover peaches and apricots with water and let stand three hours. Drain and wash again. Cover with fresh water and let stand over night. Let prunes stand over night in water to cover. In the morning cook all the fruit in the water in which it has soaked until tender. Rub through a colander. Add grated rind and juice of oranges to prepared fruit. Bring to the boiling point and add raisins and sugar. Simmer ten minutes and add nuts. Cook ten minutes longer and pour into sterilized jelly glasses. Seal with paraffin when cold.
