Farm Pointers

A strawberry patch can be continued more than two years if it is kept clean, well cultivated and fertilized, and if the old plants are removed each year in favor of the strong young plants. It usually is preferable to set new plants each spring and take out the two-year old plants after they have fruited.

Cross breeding usually should be confined to production of animals for the market with no thought of using them for breeding stock. The crossed animal usually is larger and more vigorous than either parent, but attempts to continue breeding from crossbreds usually are disappointing. The hereditary material in the cross is too complex to make the results of mating reliable.

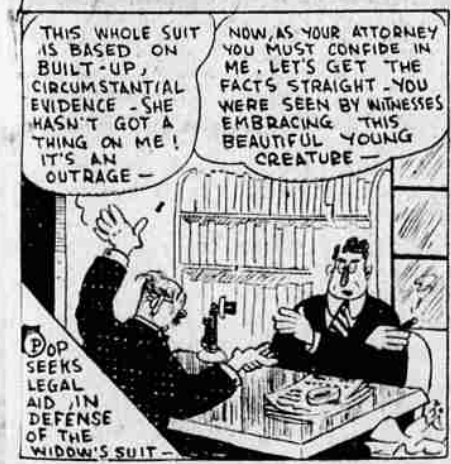

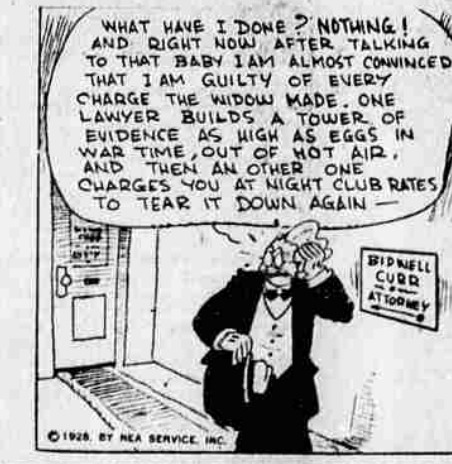
