LOMSKI IS GIVEN NOD OVER SEKYRA

Dayton O., Light Heavy-weight Soundly Beat-en by Westerner

NEW YORK, Mar. 31 (AP)—Aspirations of Joe Sekyra, of Dayton, Ohio, to gain pugilistic fame in the light heavyweight division have been sidetracked for the time being at least by Leo Lomski, the Alton, Wash., assassin.

Lomski soundly thrashed the Dayton lad in a ten-round tilt in Madison Square Garden last night before a crowd of 13,000 which paid \$49,792 to witness the spectacle.

Near the end of the round, Lomski complained of a low blow but the referee refused to recognize the claim of foul.

Lomski weighed 170, Sekyra 172 1/2. As a result of his triumph, Lomski receives consideration for a return bout with Tommy Loughran, world's light heavyweight champion, in an open air show this coming summer.

Ted Thye Keeps Wrestling Title; Defeats Clapham

PORTLAND, Ore., Mar. 31 (AP)—Ted Thye, last night retained his title as light heavyweight wrestling champion of the world when he defeated Sam Clapham, recognized as the European title holder, two out of three falls before a capacity crowd.

While not as sensational as some, the contest was by far the greatest exhibition of clever wrestling seen here in years. The weights were announced 175 pounds for Thye and 174 for Clapham. Thye took the first fall in six minutes 51 seconds when he made Clapham pound the floor in the grip of his famous wristlock. Clapham came back to win the second fall in 25 minutes 54 seconds with an old fashioned clutch and half Nelson lift. The third and deciding fall was another of those "accidents". With Thye hanging onto the ropes and Clapham tugging at him, both went over backwards with Thye on top, the force of the fall and Thye's weight being sufficient to knock Clapham out. Mutt Eddy took one fall from Ted Brown in the 30-minute preliminary.

DETROIT RACER STILL LEADING MARATHON RUN

PALMA, N. M., Mar. 31 (AP)—Arnie Suominen, Detroit, retained the leadership in the race at starting time today with an elapsed time of 150:35.25 for the 99.5 miles from Los Angeles to this point. Suominen finished the Morarity-Palma lap yesterday, a distance of 28 miles in 6:03:30.

Second place in the Morarity-Palma stretch went to Pat Demarr, Los Angeles, who set the pace for the major part of the days jaunt. His time was 6:21:30, his elapsed time 251:72:52. James Pollard, Reno, Nevada, finished in 6:24:20. Elapsed time 222:47:35.

Today the runners face a 46-mile trek from Palma to Santa Rosa.

CAMBRIDGE U. WHIPS OXFORD ON THE RIVER

MORTLAKE, England, Mar. 31 (AP)—Keeping up their post war record of victory, Cambridge university's crew scored their fifth consecutive triumph over Oxford today in their eightieth annual race on the Thames.

It was one of the easiest victories of recent years. Cambridge led all the way and finished quite fresh ten lengths ahead. The dark blue crew of Oxford was quite rowed out. After a desperate rally near the end they crossed the finish line with several men hanging over the sweeps in a condition of distress.

Cambridge covered the distance of approximately four miles in 20 minutes and 25 seconds, not threatening the record of 18 minutes and 25 seconds made by Oxford in 1911.

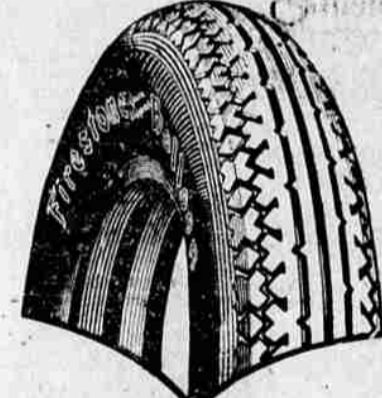
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
