

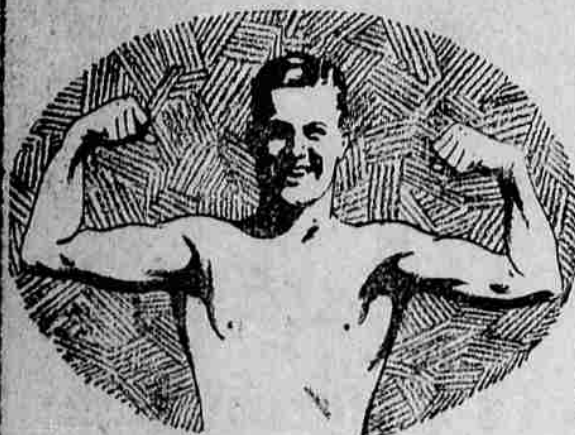
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## News of the Churches

Palm Sunday To  
Be Observed In  
Local ChurchesRt. Rev. W. P. Remington,  
Bishop of Eastern Oregon,  
Will Visit Episcopal  
Church Here.

Sunday is Palm Sunday and the church services in La Grande will be in keeping with the occasion. It is "victory" day—one week before Easter Sunday—which is April 8, and special services have been arranged for in most of the churches of the city.

A feature of special interest will be the visit of the Rt. Rev. W. P. Remington, Bishop of the Eastern Oregon diocese of the Episcopal church, in La Grande. Bishop Remington will attend all of the services at St. Peter's church here and will conduct the Holy Rite of Confirmation during the 11 o'clock worship in the morning. Palm, blessed by the Bishop, will be presented to the congregation at the close of the morning service.

Another feature at the Episcopal church Sunday will be a musical

program in the evening, beginning at 7:30 o'clock, which will be under the direction of Mrs. Leo F. Miller. This service also will be attended by Bishop Remington. A part of the Palm Sunday services at the First Presbyterian church will be the consecration of children in holy baptism. Special music has also been arranged for the service.

**Episcopal Church**  
Services at St. Peter's Episcopal church will begin with Holy Eucharist at eight o'clock in the morning, which will be attended by Bishop Remington. This will be followed by the church school at 9:45 o'clock and following this at 11 o'clock the Holy Rite of Confirmation will be conducted followed by the morning prayer. Bishop Remington will give the morning sermon, which will be followed by the blessing and distribution of the palms. George S. Hinkle will sing a solo "The Palm" by Faure.

The musical program in the evening will be the seventh of a series presented at the Episcopal church here. In addition to the program there will be an address by Bishop Remington.

**First Presbyterian Church**  
In keeping with Palm Sunday the choir of the First Presbyterian church, under the direction of Mrs. A. L. Richardson, will render the anthem "Hear Us, O Lord" by Mozart-Saar. The music was arranged by Saar especially for female voices, and the words are adapted to portray the exaltation of "The Lord, exalted above all gods." The music reflects the most ardent spirit of Mozart, and is devotedly religious.

During this service there will be the baptism of children and the pastor, the Rev. J. George Wals, will speak on the subject "The Victory Way to Golgotha." This is the day of triumph and large crowds are expected both in the morning and evening. The Rev. Wals announces, "There will also be Holy Communion."

At 7:30 o'clock in the evening Miss Edith Maguire will be at the organ console and will play as a prelude "Cathedral Grand March" by Tyder, which is considered a choice selection. As an offertory she will play "Offertory" by Richard. The choir will sing "Let Thine Eyes to the Mountains," by Mendelssohn's "Elijah," a number which has been carefully prepared under the direction of Mrs. Richardson. The Rev. Mr. Wals will use as his subject for the evening service "The Common People Heard Him Gladly."

During the Sunday school hour, at 9:45 o'clock, the pastor will install the newly elected officers of the school. At three o'clock in the afternoon the Junior Christian Endeavor society will meet, followed by a meeting of instruction for all new church members. At 6:30 o'clock in the evening the Intermediate, Senior and Young People's societies will meet in their respective places.

**First M. E. Church**  
A service in the interest of the Women's Mission society of the First Methodist church will be held Sunday morning during the 11 o'clock service. The pastor, the Rev. H. W. Parker, will give an address on the subject "The Growing, Expanding and Enlarging Life and Work of the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society." In keeping with the day Sherwood Williams will sing "The Palms."

At 6:30 o'clock in the evening the senior and junior societies of the Epworth League will meet in the church. The regular Sunday evening church services will be held at 7:30 o'clock in the evening, when the pastor will give the second of a series of address entitled "The Gospel of the Kingdom."

**English Lutheran Church**  
Palm Sunday services will be conducted at the English Lutheran church Sunday morning. The Rev. Leli H. Awe, pastor of the church, will speak on the subject, "The Shining God." The choir will render the anthem, "Jesus Wept." The church school meets in the morning at 9:45 o'clock for worship and instruction. In the evening, at seven o'clock, the Intermediate Lutheran League will meet in the church annex.**M. E. Church South**  
"Man Paints His Own Moral Portrait" will be the subject on which the Rev. J. A. Hall, pastor of the Methodist Episcopal church south will speak Sunday morning during the 11 o'clock hour of worship. This service will be preceded by Sunday school at 9:45 o'clock.

The Epworth League society will meet at 6:30 in the evening, and there will be preaching services at 7:30 o'clock, conducted by the pastor. An invitation is extended to the public to attend.

**Christian Science Church**

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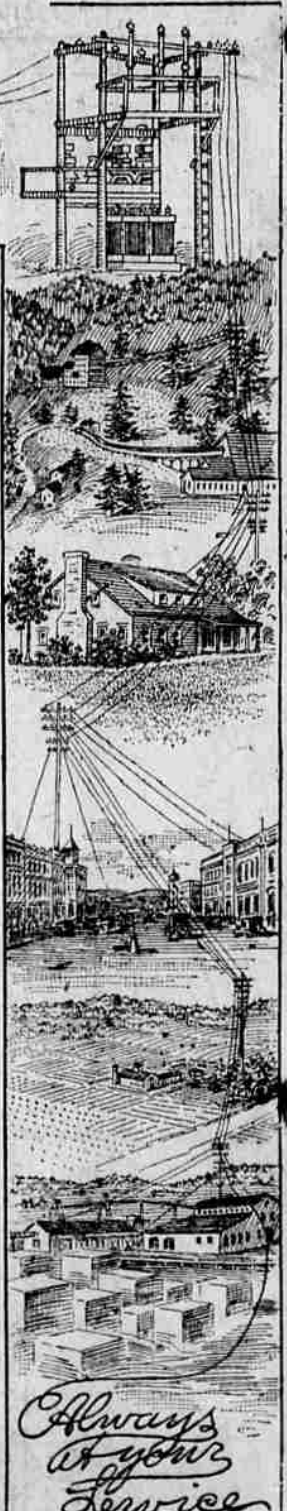
## Who Left the Cellar Light On?
