La Grande Climbs in Oregonian Telegraph Tournament Percentage

The La Grande Wing, Fin and Ploof club climbed back into a first division berth yesterday in the Oregonian telegraph shoot by virtue of two wins and one loss.

Physicians Find No T. B. Traces In Walt Johnson

WASHINGTON, Apr. 2. (AP)—Pears that another great veteran pitcher had fallen victim to tuberculosis have been set at rest here by doctors in discussing the illness of Walter Johnson.

In a formal statement issued last night, Dr. H. M. Kaufman, personal physician to the former Washington speed king and now manager of the Newark Internationals, said:

"All physical examinations, X-rays and laboratory tests have failed to reveal the slightest indication of anything of this nature. On the other hand, these same tests have shown a positive indication of a low grade colon bacillus infection of the kidneys resulting from the poisons of the influenza. This type of illness is not uncommon and without any intervening complications Walter Johnson should be himself again within a reasonably short while."

While unable to see friends at the institution, where he spent another restless day yesterday, the 34-year-old Washington baseball fan has a room full of flowers to attest their regard for him and the hospital is constantly answering queries as to his condition. His disposition continues cheerful.

WOMAN MAKES NEW ENDURANCE SWIM RECORD

MIAMI BEACH, Fla., Apr. 2. (AP)—Thirty-two hours afloat, unaided, touching neither the sides nor the bottom of the pool in which the performance took place is the new world's endurance swimming record set up by Mrs. Lotte Schoenmel, noted for her past marathon aquatic achievements.

When Mrs. Schoenmel climbed out of the Deauville pool here Sunday afternoon at 5:23 o'clock, she had shattered the American record of 30 hours formerly held by Bill Erickson of New York, and the world's record of 24 hours made by Miss Edith Johnson in England, a mark that had stood for 47 years.

While a brisk wind, blowing cold, kept most other swimmers from the water, Mrs. Schoenmel offered no protest and continued her effort clad in a white wool bathing suit which she had been compelled to substitute for a grease coating which melted away in the water, which was warm when she began her swim.

Coffee, tea and bouillon, fed to her by other swimmers, provided sustenance while in the water.

Souminen Leading In Elapsed Time

NEWYORK, N. Y., Apr. 2. (AP)—With 1928.3 miles of the race behind them, 94 survivors of the transcontinental marathon, expected to move toward Fairmount today, their 20th control, a distance of 35 miles.

Arne Souminen, Detroit, who maintained the lead for days, dropped back into fourth place for Sunday's trek from Santa Rosa to here with a time of 4:57:10. He still holds first place with an elapsed time of 17:23:15 for the better than 1000 miles covered to here. Ed Garber, a Seattle native, took the lead in Sunday's lap, covering the distance in 4:36:29. His elapsed time is 19:7:59.
